Technology Keeps Activities Going

The WHSFA is a member association of the NFHS, which provides oversight for interscholastic athletics, and serves as a forum for standards and best practices in Speech, Debate, Theatre, and Music activities. NFHS' member associations in Wisconsin are WHSFA, WIAA, and WSMA (listed in order by founding date). The networking among such organizations in Wisconsin with input from Wisconsin's DPI and DHS, as well as counterpart NFHS state associations in Michigan, Iowa, Minnesota, Illinois, Kentucky, Texas; the National Speech & Debate




Association (NSDA); and the Educational Theatre Association (EdTA) – was instrumental for sharing ideas and approaches for sustaining Speech, Debate, and Theatre across the country.

At the Fall 2019 NFHS Speech, Debate, and Theatre State Administrators' conference in Chicago, an official from the NSDA demonstrated the potential for online Speech and Debate contests. Many administrators responded, "that's cute," and dismissed the notion as a novelty that might be useful at some point in the future, but never imagined we'd have a need for it just months later. WHSFA was proud to have pioneered one of the first statewide virtual contests (though Michigan had done one in an ad hoc manner in the past) in April 2020, the *Open Virtual Speech Festival*. Ben Stewart of SpeechWire took a rather new and experimental feature he had designed for adjudicators using laptops or tablets at in-person contests – online evaluations and ballots – and adapted it to work with prerecorded video submissions. Fast-forward to spring of 2021, and WHSFA ran one of the most dynamic contest series in the country, with elements of asynchronous and live participation, including fostering participation at the Middle Level.

Wisconsin has one of the earliest one-act play contest seasons in the country, so other states looked to us for guidance on conducting their Theatre contests. By fostering opportunities for schools to enter multiple plays or enter different casts of the same play, we expanded engagement with students in new and innovative ways. Asking directors to adjudicate provided particularly insightful feedback. Yes, we all want to see live theatre in-person again, but who would have thought we'd be quarantined at home, streaming one of Broadway's most popular shows ever – *Hamilton* – directly to our living room sofas?

As COVID-19 forced organizations to pivot, some processes and procedures will be forever transformed. Others will return to pre-pandemic norms. As we look ahead to the 2021-22 school year, we will take the benefits we've gained from these innovations, and incorporate those as we attempt to return to normalcy even as some uncertainty looms. However, WHSFA remains focused on our central objective: to make our activities as accessible as possible, with as much flexibility as is fair and equitable.





Kenosha's Stanfield Earns Recognition

The National Federation of State High School Associations (NFHS) named **Holly Stanfield** as the 2021 Outstanding Speech, Debate, and Theatre Educator for Section 4 (Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Michigan, and Wisconsin). While Wisconsin has recognized state-level winners of this award previously, this is the first time a section-level winner has been named from Wisconsin. Holly teaches theatre at Mary D. Bradford High School in Kenosha, has been with the Kenosha Unified School District since 1990, and has been a public school theatre and music educator for about 40 years.

For her teaching prowess Holly has been honored as Kenosha Unified School District High School Teacher of the Year, Kohl Fellow, and Walmart Teacher of the Year. She is the 2014 recipient of the Children's Theatre Foundation Reba Robertson Award and has received a number of honorable mentions from the Tony Awards for Excellence in Theatre Education. In 2012 she was inducted into the WHSFA Theatre Hall of Fame in its second class, and in 2016 was inducted into the Educational Theatre Association (EdTA) Hall of Fame.

For the WHSFA One-Act Play contest series, Holly directs innovative shows - usually musicals - adapted for the 40minute format, leading Bradford to be one of the most decorated schools in WHSFA theatre history with numerous awards, including Critic's Choice, directing, ensemble, acting, and technical theatre. Her students have appeared numerous times on the Wisconsin High School Theatre Festival showcase stage and more than a dozen times including twice in the same year - on the International Thespian Festival main stage, including the high school pilots of Aida: School Edition, Rent: School Edition, Avenue Q: School Edition, Tarzan, Shrek, Catch Me If You Can, and The Little Mermaid. Holly was also invited by EdTA to direct the Thespian national cast of Thoroughly Modern Millie: School Edition. Under her direction, Kenosha Unified School District students have recorded seven reference CDs for Music Theatre International's school edition series, and has presented a couple times at the American High School Theatre Festival in Edinburgh, Scotland. Holly also enjoys traveling to New York City in the summer and directing staged readings of junior musicals for iTheatrics.

Holly was founding director of the Wisconsin Chapter of the Educational Theatre Association, and has been an active contributor to professional conference workshops and colleague seminars. Holly's central value in her educational philosophy is how collaboration makes everyone stronger. Holly teaches in a diverse school district and has forged

connections with high-powered professionals to work with students, who might only otherwise have those opportunities in an affluent school. Holly's own words in various news articles, podcasts, and videos are telling of her perspectives: "The arts are about telling stories and bringing people together. One show does not need to be

better than another. It's an important form in our culture."

"Every single child in this place has gifts and beauty. So many people don't know anything about teaching. A lot of these parents don't bother coming to parent-teacher conferences because I see them all the time. Theater is communication. You break down those walls where it becomes much more than theater but a larger life lesson."



Holly's former students characterize the influence of her educational philosophy on them:

Rico Santana said, "I was born in poverty, and when I came to Wisconsin she brought me up from the hard times and very tough things like abuse and depression. I was actually homeless at one point, and she took me in. She nurtured me, not only as a performer, but as a human being. She taught me how to love in those times of hate and spite. She helped me find confidence and I learned to love myself."

Natalie Lall said, "Holly always says she is an artist who teaches, not a teacher of the arts. She really has a reverence for her craft that is so incredible, and she expects all of us to come up to her level, but she is so honest with us all the time and that enhances the art that we create - together."

Recounting Holly's constant advice to "choose happy," Sam Hailer said, "Those two words changed my life. Everything in life is a choice. No matter how bad things are, there's always a bright side. That's the biggest thing I've got out of theater. Aside from how to communicate with others, it's just how to mentally keep yourself motivated and happy. That's all it is. It's all in your mind."

As part of its commitment to performing arts and academic activities, the NFHS offers a FREE online course that takes about 1 hour to complete, with abundant supplemental resources, designed for anyone who uses a theater space (inclusive of music educators). This course is perfect for *anyone* who uses an auditorium/PAC/theatre space.

One of the course authors is Kristi Ross-Clausen, board member with the Alliance for Wisconsin Theatre Education, who works with Arrow AV Group in Appleton. Kristi, a nationally respected expert in theatre safety, has held leadership and/or training roles with the AWTE, USITT, Stage Managers Association, IATSE, among others. She was recently a co-chair of the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction Theatre Standards Writing Committee. She often adjudicates, leads workshops, and consults with the Wisconsin High School Theatre Festival, an event she participated in as an alum of Tomahawk HS.

Speech Season Successes

This year's *online* State Speech Festival involved 2,269 students comprising 1,828 entries, from 277 schools. Asynchronous adjudication of 1,701 entries happened April 9-15, with 127 entries adjudicated live, April 16-17, 2021. That compares to 2019 numbers of 4,013 students in 2,840 entries, representing 340 schools. Given flexibility of asynchronous adjudication, a special allowance was made for double-entry for the 2020-21 season, with 27 schools and 53 students overall trying this provision.

Looking Ahead to 2021-22

WHSFA is planning for a return to in-person interscholastic contests, but we realize that may not be available to all schools.

As part of a strategy of transition from virtual programming during the pandemic, the WHSFA Board of Control has authorized allowance in Theatre for prerecorded shows to be submitted for asynchronous adjudication. Further details will be announced in the next few months, if not sooner. However, we are working with UW-Stevens Point to utilize their facilities for schools who are able to participate inperson.

The WHSFA Speech Advisory Committee will discuss plans for Speech, and bring forward recommendations to the Board of Control in September. The WHSFA is reviewing guidance from the NFHS in partnership with the National Speech & Debate Association (NSDA), as well as DPI and the Wis. DHS, pertaining to return to in-person contests.

The WHSFA also is taking time to engage in strategic planning, to revitalize debate, and to launch a new Film Festival program. Watch for more details as the new school year approaches!
