#### Tape-Recorded Panel-Discussion Contest

How can extra curricular activities best contribute to the educational program?

A panel of three judges unanimously rated Merrill High School's tape-recorded panel discussion first place. The group was coached by Miss Hannah Haroldson. Bill Nohr was the moderator. Panelists were Jerry Bower, Frank Paquette, Jim Boettcher, and Alan Krombholz. The alternate was Arlene Townsend. Last year Merrill placed third.

The school was awarded a plaque and the participants received individual gold medals. Their winning tape was broadcast over the state radio network at 4:00 P. M., December 26, and a copy of it is retained in this office for the use of any school during the coming year.

Second place went to Wisconsin High School of Madison, winners of last year's contest. The panel was coached by Mr. David Backstrom and moderated by Judy Lemon. Participants were Rowena Green, Robert Lenz, Mary Prince, and Dick Reznicheck. They were awarded individual silver medals and the school received a Certificate of Merit.

Third place went to Milwaukee Messmer, coached by Sister M. Dominic, S. S. N. D. Moderator was Richard Haviland, and the panelists were Joseph Linzmaier, Mary Ann Wilson, and Kathryn Garson. They received bronze medals and a Certificate of Merit for the school.

The judges, who gave these three schools identical rankings were Dr. Winston L. Brembeck and Dr. Herman H. Brockhaus of the Speech Department of the University, and Mr. Rex L. Liebenberg, Secondary School Supervisor of the State Department of Public Instruction.

#### Discussion and Debate-Problem Area 1956-7

High school students will have an opportunity to become familiar with the intricate problems of United States farm policy during the next school year. This choice of problem area was determined by a recent referendum of state speech leagues conducted by the NUEA Committee on Discussion and Debate Materials. Eighteen states gave Agricultural Policy their first choice, as opposed to nine first place votes for Labor-Management Relations and eight first choices for Natural Resources. This order of preference coincided with the Wisconsin vote returned by seventy of the WHSFA schools participating in discussion and debate, who were given an opportunity to help cast the Wisconsin vote.

The correct wording of the problem area, discussion questions, and debate propositions follows:

#### Discussion Questions

- What should be the policy of the federal government in regard to price supports?
- 2 What should be the role of government in the conservation of soil resources?
- 3 What should be the policy of the federal government in regard to agricultural surpluses?

#### Debate Propositions

1

- Resolved: that the federal government should adopt the basic principles of the Brannan Plan.
- 2 Resolved: that the federal government should sustain the prices of major agricultural products at not less than 90% of parity.
- Resolved: that the federal government should remove from use sufficient acreage to balance agricultural production.

Interpretative Reading is a new activity in our contest structure. Read page 17 of your September News Letter and page 19 of Aims, Purposes, and Definitions of Drama, Debate and Speech Contests for detailed information about this contest and for preparation suggestions.
