opened up, once again, for me to head up the Sparta High School Theatre Department, a golden ring of opportunity that I couldn't help but reach for. A significant part of that job would be to produce SHS's first ever entry into the WHSFA Theatre series.

I already had a play in mind (I ALWAYS have a play in mind) that I believed would be the perfect show for this novice entry. Having attended the WACT Festival in Platteville last February, I had the opportunity to see "The Eleventh," a moving series of vignettes portraying lives, hopes and dreams that were cut short by the events of September 11, 2001. I spoke briefly with the playwright who informed me that the literature was in the process of being published. One step led to another, and soon, rehearsals were taking place with a cast and crew of twenty-two excited young thespians.

Having only been on the audience side of the One-Act festival, the date of Districts was approached with no little fear and trepidation. It's one thing to direct a play for the sheer enjoyment of theatre - it's another thing altogether to submit to being judged by one's peers. Sherry Getter and Rick Braun, our District and sectional coordinators, were marvelous in their efforts to help a rookie one-act company learn the ropes. "The Eleventh" passed districts with glowing reviews by the judges.

The Sectional level was a different matter altogether, although we were advanced

from that event as well. It was here that the rubber met the road, and the competitive/subjective aspects of our art collided. Since we had had nothing but positive feedback up until Sectionals, it was difficult, to say the least, to be confronted by a judge who displayed nothing but disfavor with our performance. Now, one might think that this would be a demoralizing blow to a first-time troupe. Not so, it was a perfect opportunity to learn/teach about subjectivity, about taking the good with the bad, about admitting and realizing that there may be a grain of truth in a conflicting opinion, and about not getting bitter, just getting better. So, we completely re-worked the end of the show, presented it to the community and to the student body with positive results, and eagerly anticipated the weekend of State.

"The Eleventh" was scheduled as the 55th out of 57 groups to perform. Needless to say, it was a long weekend, but excellent workshops and one-act plays kept us occupied until Saturday afternoon when we began the preparation for our performance. The UWL staff was gracious and helpful. The WHSFA staff was also patient with a director who kept checking, re-checking, and checking again to make sure that we would load-in properly, etc. Our warm-up time was the best we'd ever had, cut short, surprisingly, because the one-act before us ran short. We charged ahead, set up in record time, and prepared for the house to go to black. The time had come...the anticipation was almost more than we could handle. The music started. and there was no turning back. Instead, it

was our time to shine on the stage of UWL's Toland Theatre, And shine we did.

Sniffling, sobs, and blowing noses all verified that we had achieved our first objective - that of touching our audience. That fact was verified by the standing ovation given at curtain. Only one who has performed for a Theatre Fest audience knows the true value of receiving a standing ovation at this event. It was truly the frosting on the cake, or so we thought.

Then came the critique. Would we be praised or constructively criticized? Was there hope for this rookie troupe? The answer came in the form of Mr. Malone, who entered the dressing room with three plaques in hand and the announcement that we had been unanimously awarded the Critic's Choice, Outstanding Ensemble Acting, and Outstanding Director Awards. Then, Mr. Barlow lavished us with his praise of our ability to reach the audience. our attention to details, our respectful portrayal of a devastating event and its aftereffects. He also expressed his amazement at the quality work demonstrated by a first-year group. Caught up in the emotion of the moment. I'm afraid I've not remembered everything that was said, but it was enough to fill up the motivation tank of a director and 22 young thespians for guite some time.

So there you have it...six years later...a dream fulfilled above and beyond even my boundless imagination. Have we come down yet? I don't really think so because I still find myself wondering if it was all iust...a dream.

THE FULFILLMENT OF A DREAM

In 1997, a lone theatre director made her first trek to UW-Stevens Point to experience. for the first time, the inspiration of a Wisconsin State High School Theatre Festival. It was a journey into the unknown, having had no previous experience with one-acts and their respective festivals. It was an experience that was to forever change this director's perspective on high school theatre and my expectations of the students with whom I worked. Unknown to me at the time, it was the first step to the culmination of a dream that was birthed on that weekend in November, 1997.

Due to circumstances beyond my control, it was to be six years before the fulfillment of that dream would be realized, that being selected to take a one-act to the State level. Those six years were well spent in inspiring students to excel on stage, offstage, and in the audience through attendance at subsequent Theatre Festivals, as well as through participation with my own Upstage Review Theatre Company in Sparta, WI. This organization was formed to create and perpetuate a philosophy of excellence in theatre for area teens who may not have had the benefit of quality theatre education in their schools. URTC provided encouragement in establishing a life-long love of theatre in students who previously had little or no experience with dramatic arts. It also provided an outlet for this director to continue my combined passion for theatre and kids, as well as being the motivation for returning to school at age 44 to finally add a theatre degree to my teaching certificate.

URTC thrived, producing 3-4 shows per year - everything from Moliere's "The Miser" to Neil Simon's "Lost in Yonkers": from "West Side Story" to "Forever Plaid." We rehearsed in the basement of the local American Legion and performed in church halls, dinner clubs, and empty used car garages. It was worth the effort, enabling us to develop adaptability on all fronts: for the actors, in having to adjust to ever-changing performance spaces; for the technicians, in having to create lighting grids and sound systems out of thin air; for the designers, in having to contend with no backstage, uneven cement floors, and freestanding sets that had to be built, start to finish, in 2 1/2 days.

All of this "education" worked in our favor as, finally, this past summer, an opportunity

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
