LINCOLN-DOUGLAS DEBATE TOURNEY HELD

Wisconsin Debate Coaches Association and WHSFA held the second annual Lincoln-Douglas Debate Tournament in conjunction with the State Speech Contest on April 23.

Twenty schools participated, with a total of 35 students involved in this activity. This represents an increase from last year, when only 14 schools with 25 students participated.

David Henning from Sheboygan South High School emerged the winner, and earned a trip to the National Forensic Tournament this summer. Dave is coached by T. Wesley and S. Thompson.

DEBATE RESOLUTION CHOSEN

Wisconsin debate coaches selected the 1983-84 resolution: The United States should establish uniform rules governing the procedure of all criminal courts in the nation."

This same resolution was chosen by Minnesota debate schools.

COURSES OFFERED THROUGH E.T.N

Looking for guidance to organize and manage theatre, speech or debate programs? Three courses that may be of help will be offered through the Educational Telephone Network (ETN) this judges. Avenues of research. apfall for interested coaches and judges, proaches to analysis and debating

Continuing Education Units (CEU) can be obtained for the courses which will be held from 4-5:20 p.m. The `fee for each course is a per school charge, allowing as many participants that a school wishes to include.

"Developing a Theatre Program," a three-session program, is intended for high school and junior high teachers in charge of one-act theatre programs. Since the information relates to the 4-H theatre program, youth leaders of that group may also find the classes helpful. The sessions, scheduled for September 12. 19 and 26, will cover: choosing the best play; cutting and casting the play; and directing and producing the play. The fee is \$30 and is worth .4 CEU's.

"The 1983-84 Debate Proposition" is designed to provide assistance and information for experienced and novice debate coaches and prospective skills are the topics which will be addressed. The three-session course will be held September 14, 21 and 28. The fee is \$30 and .4 CEU's are offered.

Each of the 12 sessions of "Judging WHSFA Speech Events" will be centered on one of the categories of the WHSFA spring speech events. The format of each session will be: purpose of the category; specifics about the rules; and sources and application of judging criteria. Presentations from the 1983 State Speech Contest will be used in each session. The dates are October 3, 5, 10, 12, 17, 19, 24, 26, 31 and November 2, 7 and 9. The fee is \$45 and 1.8 CEU's can be earned.

Brochures will be mailed when school opens in the fall.
