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PART I: THE BOARD OF CONTROL

November Board Meeting
The regular meeting of the WHSFA Board of Control was held on
November 4-5, 1976, at the Holiday Inn in Stevens Point. Below
are the minutes of that meeting.

Agenda Item I

The meeting was called to order by the Chair, George Buckingham, at 7:00 p.m. Members present, in addition to Buckingham, were: Frank Cirilli, Raymond Behnke, Bernard Bennett, Dennis Bonikowske, R. M. Duesterbeck, Thomas Goltry (Advisor in Drama), Wayne Gustafson, John Hahn, William Hintz, Pauline Isaacson (Advisor in Speech), William O'Brien, Ed Sievers, Richard Sorensen, and Larry Larmer, Secretary-Treasurer.

The meeting recessed at 9:30 p.m. and reconvened at 9:30 a.m. on November 5. All those present on November 4, plus Edsel Vergin, attended the November 5 session.

The Secretary-Treasurer presented framed Certificates of Membership to new Board members John Hahn (Oshkosh District), Richard Sorensen (Kenosha District), and Tom Goltry (Advisor in Drama).

Agenda Item 2

Bennett moved the unanimous election of George Buckingham to Chairman of the Board for 1976-77. Motion passed.

Slevers moved the unanimous election of Frank Cirilli to Vice-Chairman of the Board for 1976-77. Motion passed.

Agenda Item 3

Cirilli moved that the minutes of the May 6-7, 1976, be approved as distributed. Motion passed.

Agenda Item 4a

Larmer reminded district chairmen to submit Drama Participation Reports after the district Drama contest.

Agenda Item 4b

Larmer reminded Board members to submit expense reports for the current meeting.

Agenda Item 4c

Larmer reminded the Board of those members whose terms will expire at the end of the current school year.

Minutes of the Board of Control Meeting November 4-5, 1976

Agenda Item 4d

Larmer reminded the Board that the State Debate Tournament would be held at Stevens Point on the last weekend in January.

Agenda Item 4e

Larmer announced that the supplement to the 1976-77 Teachers Manual which would include spring Speech rules would be issued as soon as possible.

Agenda ltem 4f

Larmer reminded Board members that the Association would sponsor a JR High School Forensic Festival in each of the three WHSFA sections on March 19.

Agenda Item 5a

Buckingham presented the auditor's report of the State Office finances for the 1975-76 fiscal year. Buckingham commended Shirley Mortenson for her efficiency and accuracy in keeping the books. Sorensen moved acceptance of the report. Motion passed.

Agenda Item 5b

Larmer proposed a budget for the State Office for the 1976-77 fiscal year. Cirilli moved acceptance of the proposal. Motion passed.

Agenda Item 5c

Larmer distributed a summary of the district and sectional financial reports for the 1975-76 fiscal year. No action required.

Agenda Item 5d

Larmer distributed a district by district summary of the Association membership for the 1976-77 membership year. No action required.

Agenda Item 5e

Larmer reported that two one-day forensic workshops were planned for January at Platteville and Eau Claire, a summer workshop at University of Wisconsin-Whitewater, and possibly some Interpreter's Theatre workshops in the early spring. Minutes of the Board of Control Meeting November 4-5, 1976

Agenda Item 5f

Larmer reported on the financial arrangement between the Association and UWEX. He also indicated the possibility of UWEX providing part-time assistance to the Association.

Agenda Item 5g

Larmer reported that the Association's committee to study State Office finances had been unable to meet prior to the current meeting.

Agenda Item 5h

Hintz reported for the Contest Study Committee.

- A. In response to a letter from Art Mc Million (Eau Claire Memorial High School) concerning state Debate judging, the Committee made the following recommendations:
 - That coaches whose teams do not qualify for state continue to be used as judges.
 - That coaches attending the tournament continue to be used as judges in the division in which their teams are not participating.
 - That judges, as far as possible, not be assigned to rounds in which teams from their own areas are participating.
 - 4. That a school's preference in judges be solicited and honored throughout the tournament as far as possible, and that a procedure be instituted for the evaluation of judges after the tournament.
 - That judges at the State Debate Tournament be encouraged to take a flow sheet or some form of notes.
 - That during elimination rounds coaches with teams participating in the two-speaker division will not be allowed in the building in which elimination round debates are being held.
 - 7. That the practice of schools drawing for team identification numbers upon arriving at the State Debate Tournament may be suspended and the process of identifying schools by number may be conducted prior to the tournament.

(NOTE: The above recommendations were accepted separately from the rest of the Committee's report. Sievers moved acceptance of the above recommendations. Motion passed.)

- B. Hintz reviewed the following reasons for eliminating the questioning period following the speech in Demonstration Speaking and Extemporaneous Speaking:
 - 1. This practice is not uniform across judges. Some employ the practice while others do not.
 - Judges have been known to ask very unfair questions of the contestants.
 - Occasionally questions are repetitious of the content of the speech.
 - 4. The questions can reflect a personal bias on the part of the judge.
 - 5. Overall, the questioning makes little positive contribution to the evaluation process.
- C. It was reported that Tom Goltry, in consultation with Calvin Quayle, design the new critique sheet for Interpreter's Theatre.
- D. It was recommended that the Secretary-Treasurer investigate the possibility of changing WHSFA medals to some form of pin.
- E. The Committee recommended and reaffirmed that, while rule change made by WHSFA may affect those contests and tournaments sanction by other organizations, the WHSFA has no responsibility to provide rules acceptable and pleasing to such organizations.

Agenda Item 6a

R. M. Duesterbeck and Dennis Bonikowske were named delegate and alternate, respectively, to the NUEA meeting on Discussion and Debate to be held in San Francisco in December, 1976.

Agenda Item 6b

Vergin moved to deny a request from Colby High School to transfer from the Eau Claire District to the Stevens Point District. Motion passed. Minutes of the Board of Control Meeting November 4-5, 1976

Agenda Item 7

The Secretary-Treasurer was instructed to look into recent legislation which may have implications for the transport of youngsters by debate and forensic coaches.

Adjournment

The meeting adjourned at 11:25 a.m., November 5, 1976.







"A Weekend Together"

Wauwatosa, Wisconsin WHAT?

Sufficiently snatched your attention? Well then, let's settle into specifics. The Wisconsin Secondary School Theatre Association joined with the WHSFA during its one-act play contest in Stevens Point December 3, 4, and 5 in a weekend designed specifically for the high school drama teacher seeking to create welldressed and stylish productions.

Friday was designated as a "day of days, a day of plays." Weekend participants were encouraged to see the 15-plus one-act plays which had made their way to the state competition, Reflections on the "why 's" and "wherefore 's" of a production's inclusion in the contest could be shared with fellow drama coaches. Further discussion of the day's plays and a sharing of ideas continued at an informal, late evening get-together.

Review of contest plays continued Saturday morning. Badger High School's production of "You're a Good Man, Charlie Brown" was a must on everybody's "to be seen" schedule, for Gary Parker, the weekend's resident workshop leader, later worked with the show's cast and crew in recreating their production. Parker's afternoon workshop proved to be a true eye-opener in which cast members were encouraged to explore new dimensions and possibilities within the production. Parker's dynamic approach soon had students working creatively and digging in to such essentials to production as focus and motivation. The cast was constantly encouraged to be aware of the all-important "3 W's"--where, who, and what. Without knowing who is where in what situation, Parker maintained, a scene will fall apart, lose its life and vitality, and actors will be unable to handle the material because it will lack base and direction.

Following this workshop designed to broaden the horizons of high school directors. WSSTA's board of directors met with weekend participants in a HELP! session -- an hour and a half of brainstorming on such topics as play promotion, fund raising, and a system of awards. A sharing of ideas and a fuller understanding of the WSSTA's role in relation to the high school drama coach in Wisconsin was achieved.

Those who came to spend "A Weekend Together" were commanded by powers greater than themselves to join again, in the evening, with Gary Parker for a session entitled "Improvs You Can Use." This workshop got the old adrenalin a-pumping, the old heart a-thumping. and the old imagination a-creating. The bright spot in this twohour session was the production of a 27-member song and dance

routine—a sure—fire show—stopper. This appeared to be one of Parker's favorites, and the eyes of those who had worked with him previously took on a new twinkle as he began working with the many nonsingers and nondancers who, 20 minutes later, gave their small audience a sparkling show opener.

How do you follow an act like that? By scheduling "everything you wanted to know" sessions bright and early the following morning. Noncostumers were given marvelous hints on easy and adaptable costume pieces by Frieda Bridgeman of UW-Stevens Point. Suggestions on building up a solid and very versatile costume collection highlighted this session. Meanwhile, another UW-Stevens Point professor, Tony Schmitt, worked with directors who are troubled by the "Acting of the Untrained Actor."

Later in the morning, energies were focused on legitimate tax deductions related to the field of theatre education. Al Katz of UW-Superior led this session. While "Katz's Taxes" was in session, James Moore of UW-Stevens Point "shuffled off to Buffalo" with other weekend participants who chose to concentrate their efforts on "Dancing for the Nondancer."

The 'Weekend Together' closed with a noon buffet with Wallace Smith in Stevens Point's University Center. Mr. Smith is the past president of the American Theatre Association (ATA) and presently serves as the vice-principal of Evanston Township High School. The Illinois State High School Theatre Festival has also been one of Smith's projects in the recent past.

The picture of the future of high school drama in the United States painted by Mr. Smith was hardly a rosy one. However, such a projected view can serve as a directional force for those who spent the weekend with members of the WSSTA and the WHSFA. The path to be taken is much clearer now—high school drama programs must define their directions and dimensions and move to assert the benefits to high school students that such programs can provide.

So, you see, "A Weekend Together" makes closing your curtains, cancelling your matinees, and rescheduling your lives worthwhile. Don't let the opportunity pass by next year. Plan on joining with the WSSTA and the WHSFA in their efforts to reinforce and strengthen the aims of high school drama programs. You will be doing yourself, as an advocate, supporter, and director of high school drama, and your school program an enormous favor.
