WELCOME TO MEMBERSHIP

Since almost all schools renew their membership in the WHSFA before the start of the new school year, your school has probably already joined. Your promptness in returning the cards to us along with your 1972-73 dues is appreciated.

The names of last year's 461 member schools are listed in the roster in the back of this Newsletter. After each school, the district in which it is located is shown, plus he number of years it has been a member. The number 47 after a school's name in the current roster identifies most of the charter members. They are the schools which have held uninterrupted membership since 1925.

All schools in Wisconsin, public or private, which offer work at the 9th, 10th 11th, or 12th grade levels may join the WHSFA. Junior high schools are eligible for membership, but only their 9th grade students may compete in contests sponsored by the Association.

The primary function of the Association is to conduct the major inter-school forensic contest program in the state. However, more important than naming winners is the educational experience gained by the thousands of Wisconsin high school students who participate in debate, drama, and speech contests each year. The participation summaries in this Newsletter should dispel any fear that the WHSFA program benefits only a select few.

The nature and quality of the Association's program is the concern of the WHSFA Board of Control. This elected group of 14 educators determines the policies and rules of the Association. Eleven Board members are high school principals or administrators who serve as chairmen of the 11 districts. Three others are speech teachers or coaches who function as chairmen of the three sections. As chairmen of districts and sections these Board members administer those policies and rules which apply to their particular areas.

The principal administrative officer of the WHSFA is the secretary-treasurer, who is responsible for the state office of the Association. He is a faculty member employed by University Extension, which also provides the space and equipment for the office. The WHSFA reimburses University Extension \$9,000 annually as partial payment for services received, according to an agreement between the WHSFA Board of Control and the University Extension administration.

Each membership year in the Association begins on September 1 and ends on August 31. Annual dues are payable on or before October 1. The schedule of dues adopted by the Board at its meeting in May, 1969, is as follows:

\$25 for schools with an enrollment of 149 or less

\$35 for schools with an enrollment of 150 to 349

\$40 for schools with an enrollment of 350 or more

Money collected in dues is used for a variety of purposes. It pays for: expenses of Board meetings and committee meetings; some of the services provided by University Extension; publication of the Newsletters, the Contest Handbook, Play List, and other special pamphlets; the printing of critique sheets, ballots and other supplies; purchase of materials for use in contests, especially debate; and the cost of mailing publications and materials to the member schools.

In 1972-73, the secretary-treasurer of the WHSFA will be Mr. Larry E. Larmer. Professor Herman H. Brockhaus, who has served in that capacity since 1965, retired on June 30, 1972 (see next page). It is the hope of the new secretary-treasurer that the administration of the Association shall continue to meet the high standards set by Dr. Brockhaus and the program of the WHSFA shall continue to merit your support.



"BROCK" RETIRES FROM WHSFA

On June 30, 1972, Dr. Herman H. Brockhaus retired as Professor of Communication Arts at the University of Wisconsin and University Extension. At that time, he also left his post as Secretary-Treasurer of the Wisconsin High School Forensic Association.

In spite of a geographically varied professional career, Dr. Brockhaus' association with WHSFA is of long standing. After receiving a B. A. from North Central College, Naperville, Illinois, in 1929, he became a teacher of English and speech at New London High School, New London, Wisconsin, where his duties included coaching speech and debate activities. Dr. Brockhaus stayed at New London until 1938 and, in the meantime, completed his M. A. at the University of Wisconsin-Madison in 1937.


Dr. Brockhaus spent the next few years away from Wisconsin, serving as Professor and Chairman of the Department of Speech at Pacific University in Forest Grove, Oregon, from 1938-41; instructor in the Department of Public Speaking at Oberlin College, Oberlin, Ohio, in 1941-42; and from 1942-45, he served in the United States Army Medical Corps.

In 1947, Dr. Brockhaus received an appointment in the Department of Communication Arts (then called "Speech") at the University of Wisconsin-Madison where he served both the College of Letters and Science and University Extension.

Those who have come to know "Brock" since 1965 when he became Secretary-Treasurer of WHSFA have marveled at the efficiency, dedication to duty, and warm personal graciousness he brought to that post. But as thorough as Dr. Brockhe was in his work with WHSFA, he by no means limited his professional activities the Association. After his return to Wisconsin he published several articles in both regional and national professional journals, taught at least one class per semester for the College of Letters and Science at University of Wisconsin-Madison, and developed and executed virtually hundreds of instructional programs in speech communication for a wide variety of groups reached by University Extension services. Dr. Brockhaus' listing in Who's Who in America, Directory of American Scholars, and his receipt in 1971 of the Andrew T. Weaver Award given by the Wisconsin Speech Communication, all attest to the quality of his professional contributions.

Those associated with WHSFA will miss Brock's guidance, patience, and congeniality; but it is the sincere hope of all that he is now beginning the happiest period of his life and that he will bestow upon the Association the great honor of "staying in touch."

PART I GENERAL INFORMATION

ANNUAL DUES MUST BE PAID ON OR BEFORE OCTOBER 1. THE BOARD OF CONTROL HAS RULED THAT A SCHOOL WHICH FAILS TO PAY ITS DUES BY OCTOBER 1 MAY NOT PARTICIPATE IN ANY ASSOCIATION ACTIVITY. EXCEPTIONS MAY BE MADE AT THE DISCRETION OF THE DISTRICT CHAIRMAN AFTER CONSULTATION WITH THE SECRETARY-TREASURER.

MEMBERSHIP AND ORGANIZATION

Membership Registration

Last July each school which was a member of the WHSFA in 1971-72 was sent a set of membership registration cards and a statement requesting payment of dues. When the filled-in cards are received by the state office, one copy is filed and the other is forwarded to the district chairman. Thus both the state office and the district chairman have information about the contest activities a school plans to enter, the names of the coaches in charge, and the payment of dues. The cards are also used in the preparation of state and district mailing lists.

Materials

At the start of the school year, members receive the following materials from the state office:

Four copies of the WHSFA Newsletter for September 1972. Two copies of the WHSFA Contest Handbook and Play List

Reference material on the debate proposition, if the school indicated on the registration card that it planned to participate in debate

WHSFA Newsletters

The state office publishes a Newsletter each year in September, November, February, and May. The September issue contains a record of the previous year's activities, a copy of the constitution of the Association, and the rules under which the contests are conducted. The other three issues include current news items, announcements, and contributed articles.

Districts and Sections

For information about sub-district or district contests, schools are advised to write or phone their district chairman. For information about sectional contests, they should emmunicate directly with their sectional chairman. The secretary-treasurer of the association is the person to write or phone concerning state contests.

The district directory in the front part of this Newsletter and the roster of schools in the back show the districts to which members belong. The names, addresses, and phone numbers of the district and sectional chairmen are on the inside front cover.

Elections of Board Members

The normal schedule for electing persons to the 14-member Board of Control is to have five people elected each fall, except for every third year when four are chosen. Of the board members elected each year, one is a speech teacher or coach, who serves as a sectional chairman. The others are high school principals or school administrators, who function as district chairmen. Board members are elected for three-year terms by schools within the district or section. District chairmen and sectional chairmen may be re-elected.

In September and October of 1972, elections will be held in the following districts and section for the terms indicated:

Mr. Peter C. Hamel, Principal of Preble High School in Green Bay, has chosen not to be a candidate for re-election to the chairmanship of the Green Bay District. Mr. Hamel has served on the Board for two full terms; he was first elected in 1966.

At the meeting of the Board last fall, Mr. Gaylord K. Unbehaun, Administrator of Brillion Public Schools, said he would be a candidate for re-election this fall. He was elected for one year to complete the remainder of Mr. Lynch's term after Mr. Lynch resigned.

Mr. Herman Laatsch, Administrator of Argyle Public Schools, informed the state office that he would not be a candidate for re-election this September. Elected to the Board in 1961, he served until mid-year of 1963. He was elected again in 1966 and has served two full terms as chairman of the Platteville District.

Mr. George Buckingham is a Board member whose years of service to the WHSFA are exceeded only by those of the chairman of the Board. Mr. Buckingham, Director of Student Services in the Whitewater Public Schools, was first elected as chairman of the Whitewater District in 1960. He has held that office for 12 consecutive years, and has expressed his willingness to be a candidate again this fall.

Mr. Wallace E. Hoffman has also agreed to be available for re-election for another term. Coming to the Board in 1969, he has been chairman of the Central Section for the past three years. Mr. Hoffman is a teacher and coach at Lombardi Jr. High School in Green Bay.

WHSFA SPONSORED CONTESTS

Calendar of Contest Dates

A five-year calendar of WHSFA contest dates is published in the front section of this Newsletter. This calendar was approved by the Board of Control last spring. All dates except those for sub-district contests are firm dates. District, sectional and state contests will be held on the dates designated. The dates shown for sub-district competition are the latest dates on which sub-district contests may be held.

Fixing firm dates for major WHSFA contests and publishing them five years in advance is another effort toward reducing conflicts with other activities. It is consistent with the decision to publish a combined calendar of WHSFA, WIAA, and WSMA dates. Conflicts with the state speech contest in April are especially critical because of the large number of students involved and because of the distances some of them must travel.

Drama Contest

To help drama directors in their search for plays for the fall drama contest, the state office again has published and distributed to all member schools a *Play List* which gives the titles of recommended plays. This advisory type of list is in line with the WHSFA policy of permitting a school to use any play it wishes in the drama contest.

Any school expecting to enter the drama contest this fall must send to its WHSFA district chairman by October 1 the name and author of the play it has chosen for the contest. If the final choice of play has not been determined by October 1, the names of those in preparation are to be sent in. Please note that the information is to be sent directly to the WHSFA district chairman. Any school which does not meet the October 1 deadline will be ineligible to participate in the drama contest, according to a supplementary rule for drama.

Several new rules governing the drama contest were adopted by the Board of Control in May, 1971. The regulations state more explicitly that the major focus of interest in a production must be on character relationship, dialogue, and action. Further, they specifically prohibit the following types of entries in the WHSFA drama contest: musical dramas, productions which are predominantly choral speaking, and productions which are predominantly pageants, spectacles, and dance dramas. All rules applying to the drama contest will be found in this Newsletter in the general rules and the supplementary rules for drama.

Debate Contest

RESOLVED: That governmental financial support for all public elementary and secondary education in the United States should be provided exclusively by the federal government. This is the official WHSFA debate proposition for 1972-73, chosen through a preferential ballot last May. The state office mailed ballots to all schools taking part in the WHSFA debate program in 1971-72. The proposition selected was announced in the Newsletter for May, 1972.

As in previous debate seasons, the four issues of *The Forensic Quarterly*, published by the Committee on Discussion and Debate of the National University Extension Association, will be sent to all schools planning to enter debate this year. The quarterlies are purchased from the Committee by the state office and are distributed at no cost to member schools which plan to take part in debate. Other materials which are received from the Committee on Discussion and Debate will also be mailed to those schools which indicate on their membership registration card an intention to participate in debate.

The WHSFA debate competition consists of district tournaments, sectional tournaments, and a state tournament. The structure of the state tournament provides for the selection of a single first-place winner, a second-place winner, and two third-place winners. In addition, there is a consolation series in the state tournament, for teams which do not survive the qualifying rounds. All the regulations which apply to the WHSFA debate contest are printed in this Newsletter in the general rules and the supplementary rules for debate.

Speech Contest

The spring forensic program is the largest activity sponsored by the WHSFA. It provides thousands of students an opportunity to participate in a variety of events and compete with talent from the entire state. Many schools hold local contests to select contestants who represent them in WHSFA competition at the sub-district, district, and state levels.

Detailed information about the different spring speech events will be found in the WHSFA Contest Handbook, two copies of which are mailed to each member school. Specific rules for each event are published in this Newsletter in the supplementary rules for each contest.

INSTITUTES AND INDEPENDENT TOURNAMENTS

Institutes and Workshops

Universities and colleges in Wisconsin support the program of the Wisconsin High School Forensic Association in a number of ways. The departments of speech, communication, and theatre in several of them sponsor institutes and workshops for high school students and coaches.

The programs listed below are those reported to the state office in response to an inquiry sent out last spring. They include a workshop to be conducted by the Wisconsin Debate Coaches Association. If you are interested in taking your students to a particular program, write to the person in charge for detailed information. Do not assume you will automatically receive announcements from the host institution or group. Your school may not be on the mailing list used by the sponsoring organization.

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PROFESSIONAL ORGANIZATIONS

There are in Wisconsin three professional organizations for teachers of speech and coaches of extra-curricular speech activities. None is directly affiliated with the WHSFA, but all have interests and concerns which are shared by the WHSFA. Therefore we are happy to include in this Newsletter the names of the organizations, their respective purposes, and their officers.

Wisconsin Speech Communication Association

The membership of the Wisconsin Speech Communication Association includes speech teachers at all educational levels. The avowed purpose of the organization is

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"to unite the teachers, coaches, and supervisors of speech in Wisconsin in order to promote (1) better training of speech teachers, (2) better speech training and better coaching and supervising of speech activities, and (3) more and better speech training in the schools of Wisconsin." The officers of the WSCA for the current year are: president, Mr. Thomas Pinter, Oconomowoc Senior High School; first vice-president, Dr. Charles Haas, University of Wisconsin-LaCrosse; second vice-president, Mr. William O'Brien, Janesville Craig High School; secretary, Miss Thelma Rothe, Fennimore High School; treasurer, Dr. Patricia Townsend, University of Wisconsin-Whitewater; editor of the WSCA Journal, Mr. Craig Streff, Wauwatosa East High School.

The WSCA will hold two meetings in 1972-73. The autumn meeting will be Friday November 3, 1972, at the Milwaukee Inn in Milwaukee. The spring meeting will be Friday and Saturday, May 4 and 5, 1973, at the Pioneer Inn in Oshkosh.

Wisconsin Debate Coaches Association

Both individuals and schools may hold membership in the Wisconsin Debate Coaches Association. Individual membership is open to any person in the state connected in any way or interested in debate. The purpose of the WDCA as stated in its constitution is "to promote the interests of interscholastic debate in Wisconsin by assisting in the regulation and improvement of tournaments and by serving as a forum for the airing of opinions relative to these objectives." The officers for 1972-73 are: president, Mr. Ronald Ernst, Nicolet High School; vice-president, Mr. Terry Parks, Sheboygan North High School; secretary, Mrs. Janice Settle, Greendale High School; treasurer, Miss Drucilla Munson, Brookfield Central High School.

Wisconsin Forensic Coaches Association

The Wisconsin Forensic Coaches Association is the newest of the three organizations, formed in the spring of 1970. Its membership is comprised of coaches of interschool forensic activities. Its declared purpose is "to promote the interests of interscholastic forensics in Wisconsin by assisting in the regulation and improvement of forensic practices and by serving as a forum for the airing of opinions concerning forensic activities." The officers of the WFCA for the present year are: president, Mr. Karl E. Kocher, West Bend East High School; vice-president, Mr. John Hughes, Waterford High School; secretary, Miss Elaine Schroeder, Mequon Homestead High School; treasurer, Mr. William Mitchell, Middleton High School.

FORENSIC AND DRAMA ORGANIZATIONS

Besides the Wisconsin High School Forensic Association, there are in the state three other scholastic organizations whose goal is the development of students through forensic or dramatic activities. Two of the organizations are national leagues; the other is an international society. Because these associations and the WHSFA have common interests, we are pleased to publish the following information which was provided by the state officers.

National Forensic League

The National Forensic League was founded in 1925 for the purpose of "training youth for leadership." The NFL is comprised of about 1100 chapters and 2100 affiliates in 50 states. Twenty-six Wisconsin schools currently hold NFL charters and several others are affiliate members. In order for a school to become a member or affiliate, it must meet certain participation requirements.

An on-going incentive program is sponsored by the NFL, consisting of pins, certificates, and an annual national tournament in six events: debate, boys extempore, girls extempore, oratory, dramatic reading, and student congress. To be eligible for the national tournament, a student must receive first place in a state contest. Among the students from Wisconsin high schools who qualified for national NFL competition

last year and participated in the tournament held at Wake Forest University, Winston-Salem, North Carolina, June 19-23, 1972, were: Pam Bauter and Margaret Lewis, Mequon Homestead, debate; Walter White, Mequon Homestead, boys' extemp; Janet Pitterlie, Eau Claire Memorial, girls' extemp; Becky Woods, Oconomowoc High School, girls' extemp; Karla Johnson, West Bend East, dramatic interpretation; Ray Edwards, Brookfield Central, student congress; Peter Wilke, Milwakuee Pius XI, student senate.

The remaining Wisconsin contestants in the tournament came from Marquette High School which won the cumulative (T.K.A.) sweepstakes with 279 rounds and the yearly sweepstakes with 106 rounds—both national records. Mark Foley won he national championship in boys' extemp and John Patek won the national championship in oratory. Mark Foley and Jeff Clark reached the final round in debate, losing on a 3-2 decision. Dean Richards was 4th in radio and a quarter-finalist in boys' extemp and oratory. John Daly reached the quarterfinals in oratory and participated in dramatic interpretation, as did Robert End. It was the second year in a row that Marquette won the national championship. Mr. James Copeland was named "Coach of the Year."

In Wisconsin the NFL District Committee is made up of the following coaches: Miss Drucilla Munson, Brookfield Central; Mr. James Copeland, Marquette; Mr. John Stienbach, West Bend West; and Mr. Art McMillion, Eau Claire Memorial, chairman.

National Catholic Forensic League

The National Catholic Forensic League is an organization of both public and private schools for the purpose of training "active Catholic leaders." It operates in over 40 diocese, and membership in the Wisconsin CFL numbers 21 schools. Each year the NCFL sponsors a Grand National Tournament. This tournament includes the following events: debate, boys and girls extempore, original oratory, oratorical declamation, oral interpretation, and student congress. To qualify for NCFL competition, a contestant must place first, second, or third in his event at the State Catholic Tournament.

Some of the contestants from Wisconsin who participated in the Grand Tournament held at Pittsburgh, May 12-13, were: Nancy Schmalling, Delavan-Darien, declamation; Peter Wilke, Milwaukee Puis XI, boys' extemp; Betsy Guiler, Delavan-Darien, and Patty Kulpa, Milwaukee Pius XI, oral interpretation; Indre Bauza, Kenosha St. Joseph and Sherri DeWeerd, Delavan-Darien, girls' extemp.

Marquette University High School was represented by the remaining students and won the tournament in which 957 students from 41 dioceses participated, for the third consecutive year (a record) with 264 points (also a record). Mark Foley and Jeff Clark reached the semifinals of debate as did David Dreis and Mark Miner. John Patek repeated as national champion in original oratory with Robert End also making the final round. Matt Liedle reached the quarterfinals in oratory. Dean Richards and Tom McCarthy were quarterfinalists in boys' extemp and Pat Mayer made the quarterfinals in declamation. Brian Myles in oral interpretation and Jeff gnaszak in declamation did not place.

International Thespian Society

The purpose of the International Thespian Society is to encourage development of the theatre arts in secondary schools. To this end, a school which has membership in the society organizes a Thespian Troupe. To belong to the Troupe, students must fulfill membership requirements of the International Constitution—a point system for acting and crew participation. It is essentially an honor to be selected for membership.

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There are approximately 60 Troupes in Wisconsin. Each fosters the growth of theatre arts in its school and keeps in touch with other Troupes and their activities through a state newsletter. State Thespians also met at the Wisconsin State Thespian Conference which was held at Janesville Craig High School on November 19, 20, and 21, 1971. The program included special conference performances by the Stratford, Ontario, Children's Theatre, by Mr. Tiber Zana of the Wisconsin Ballet Company, and by Theatre X, a contemporary theatre group from Milwaukee. Other performances were given by Wisconsin Thespian troupes from Sheboygan, Luxemburg-Casco, Wayland Academy, Beaver Dam, Shorewood, and Waukesha Catholic Memorial. In addition, various workshops in theatre were presented.

Several Wisconsin Thespian troupes attended the International Thespian Conference held at Ball State University, June 19-23, 1972. Luxemburg-Casco, Wayland Academy, and Janesville Craig presented workshops at the Conference. Part II

GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS

CONSTITUTION OF THE WISCONSIN HIGH SCHOOL FORENSIC ASSOCIATION

Article I. Name

The name of this organization shall be the Wisconsin High School Forensic Association.

Article II. Purpose

The purpose of this organization shall be:

- a. to promote forensic activities in the high schools of Wisconsin.
- b. to stimulate an interest in dramatics, debate, and other forms of speech work.
- c. to improve the quality of high school speech work,
- d. to provide channels for inter-school activity in forensics.

Article III. Membership

Section 1. Any public or private high school in Wisconsin may become a member by making written application to the secretary-treasurer of the Board of Control and paying the annual dues.

Section 2. Any public high school in Upper Michigan will be admitted to membership by making written application to the secretary-treasurer of the Board of Control and paying the annual dues, provided:

- a. its application is approved by a majority of the member schools in the district to which such school requests to be assigned.
- b. membership of such applicant be limited to affiliation with one state organization.
- c. the application has the approval of the Michigan High School Forensic Association Council.

Section 3. The annual dues shall be determined by the Board of Control. The membership year shall be from September 1 to August 31.

Article IV. Administration

Section 1. Officers.

- a. The officers of the Association shall be 11 district chairmen and three sectional chairmen. These 14 officers shall be the Board of Control of the Association.
- b. The officers of the Board of Control shall be a chairman and a secretary-treasurer.
- c. The chairman shall be elected annually by the Board of Control for a term of one year,
- d. The secretary-treasurer shall be a member of the University Extension Department of Speech of the University of Wisconsin. The secretary-treasurer shall be the principal administrative officer of the Association,

Section 2. Board of Control.

- a. The affairs of the Association shall be administered by the Board of Control.
- b. The district chairmen shall be school administrators, elected by the member schools of their respective districts. Each district chairman shall be responsible for conducting forensic affairs of his district in accordance with Association regulations. Each district chairman shall make reports of the district contests to the secretarytreasurer.

c. Each district chairman shall organize for his district an executive committee, consisting of:

- (1) one representative from a University of Wisconsin campus, and
- (2) one high school principal, and
- (3) two coaches or teachers of speech.
- d. The three sectional chairmen shall be speech coaches elected by the member schools of their respective sections. Each sectional chairman shall be responsible for conducting forensic affairs of his section. Each sectional chairman shall report promptly the results of his sectional contests to the secretary-treasurer.
- The term of office of the members of the Board shall be three years, or until a successor is elected. The term of office of members of the Board of Control shall begin on the date on which the election is completed.
- f. The office of chairman of any district or section shall be declared vacant when the incumbent of that office:
 - (1) moves to another district or section, or
 - (2) leaves the profession, or
 - (3) absents himself from two consecutive board meetings without a reason acceptable to a majority of the Board.
- In case of a vacancy in a district or sectional chairmanship the remaining members of the Board of Control shall appoint a chairman to serve until the next annual election.
- The duties of the Board of Control shall be to direct generally all the affairs of the Association and to enact the rules which shall govern the activities of the
- i. The Board shall meet annually as soon as convenient after the annual election of district and sectional chairmen. Seven members of the Board shall constitute a quorum.
- j. Special meetings of the Board may be called by the chairman or by the secretarytreasurer, or must be called by the secretary-treasurer upon request of any five members of the Board of Control.

Section 3. Sections, Districts, and Sub-Districts.

a. For administrative purposes the state shall be divided into sections and districts as follows:

Northern Section Eau Claire District River Falls District Superior District

Southern Section Kenosha District Milwaukee District Platteville District Whitewater District

Central Section Green Bay District La Crosse District Oshkosh District Stevens Point District

- b. Any school may transfer from one district to another by securing written approval from the Board of Control.
- c. The chairman of a district shall be empowered to set up sub-districts in his district, all schools within a sub-district being members of the same district. In setting up sub-districts the chairman shall consult with the executive committee of his district.

SECTION 4. Elections.

a. Each member school shall be entitled to one vote for its district chairman, one vote for its sectional chairman and one on any question submitted for a referendum.

- b. The election of district chairmen shall be conducted in the following manner:
 - The primary election. On or before September 15, the secretary-treasurer shall mail a primary ballot to each member school in the districts in which a chairman is to be elected. Each member school may nominate one administrator for district chairman. Primary ballots shall be returned to the secretary-treasurer on or before October 1. The two administrators who receive the highest number of votes shall be declared the nominees for that district. In case of a tie for second place on the primary ballots, all persons so tied shall be considered nominees. If any nominee receives a majority of the primary votes cast in a district, such nominee shall be declared elected by the secretary-treasurer.
 - Final ballot. On or before October 10, the secretary-treasurer shall mail a final ballot to each member school in the districts in which a chairman is to be elected. The ballot shall list the nominees in alphabetical order. Final ballots shall be returned to the secretary-treasurer on or before October 20. The nominee receiving the highest number of votes on the final ballot shall be declared elected. In case of a tie, the chairman of the Board shall appoint a distinterested person to determine the election by lot.
- c. The election of the sectional chairmen shall be conducted by the secretarytreasurer in a manner corresponding to the method of election of district chairmen.

Article V. Constitution and Standing Rules

Section 1. The articles governing the Association shall be the Constitution and the Standing Rules.

Section 2. Amendments.

- a. Amendments to the Constitution may be initiated by the Board of Control at any regular or special meeting, or by the secretary-treasurer upon petition from 25 member schools.
- b. Ratification of Amendments. After being initiated as required above, a proposed amendment must be submitted to a referendum of all member schools. Ballots must be returned within 30 days after being mailed by the secretary-treasurer. If approved by a majority of schools voting in the referendum, the proposed amendment must be ratified at the next regularly scheduled meeting of the Board of Control in order to be declared adopted. Any adopted amendment to the Constitution shall be published in the next issue of the WHSFA Newsletter.

SECTION 3. Standing Rules.

The Standing Rules may be changed or amended by a majority vote of the Board of Control at any regular or special meeting.

STANDING RULES

I. General Rules

1. Membership.

The membership year of the Association shall begin on September 1. The annual dues must be paid on or before October 1. A school which fails to pay its dues by October 1 may not participate in any Association activity. Exceptions may be made at the discretion of the district chairman after consultation with the secretary-treasurer.

2. Student Eligibility.

*a. Any bona fide pupil in good standing and in regular attendance in the 9th, 10th. 11th, or 12th grade of the member school shall be eligible to compete in contests conducted by the Association.

- b. Student eligibility blanks must be sent to the chairman one week prior to each sub-district contest, or to the chairman of the first contest beyond the local contest.
- 3. Coaches.

Drama, debate, and speech coaches must be licensed teachers of the school.

4. Dues.

The dues structure for 1972-73 shall be:

\$25 for schools with an enrollment of 149 or less \$35 for schools with an enrollment of 150 to 349 \$40 for schools with an enrollment of 350 or more

5. Contests.

The Association shall sponsor the following contest activities:

- a. Drama
- b. Debate
- c. Speech

Extemporaneous Speaking Four-minute Speech Oratory Public Address Significant Speeches Declamation Play Acting Poetry Reading Prose Reading

6. Levels of Competition.

- 7. Requirements for Advancement.
 - a. In order to advance to the next level of competition, the following requisites must be met:

Drama...... Beginning with the sub-district, a school must receive a grade of A. Debate...... Beginning with the district, a school must achieve a record in the tournament of four wins and two losses, or better.

Speech...... Beginning with the sub-district, a contestant must receive a grade of A.

8. Judges.

a. Each contest shall be judged by one or more judges. For the following contests the number of judges specified is required:

Drama...... Three judges at district, section, and state.

Debate....... At the state tournament, single judges for all rounds except:
three judges in the quarter-final and semi-final rounds, and five
in the final.

Speech...... Single judges for each section at district and state.

- *b. In a sub-district speech contest, a single judge may be used for each section; however, by agreement of all participating schools, three or five judges may be be used instead of one. No section shall be judged by an even number of judges, two or four, because of a possible difficulty in determining a contestant's final grade from the ratings turned in.
- *c. In any contest, by agreement of the majority of participating schools, the coaches may serve as judges, with no coach judging contestants from his own school.

9. Grades and Decisions.

a. In a drama contest and in a speech contest the judge or judges shall grade each presentation A, B, or C, according to merit, possibly having several of the same grades or none of some grades. If several judges are used, each judge shall mark his ballot without consulting any other person or persons, including the other judges.

b. In a drama contest and in a speech contest when several judges are used, the grade given by the majority of the judges shall be the final grade. (Example: A, A, C = A; A, C, C = C.) When there is no majority of any one grade, the mean of the judges' ratings shall be the final grade; thus A, B, C = B.

c. The value of the grades A, B, and C shall be interpreted as follows: A =

excellent to superior, B = good to very good, C = fair.

d. In a debate the judge or judges shall declare which of the two teams, affirmative or negative, won the debate. If several judges are used, each judge shall mark his ballot without consulting any other person or persons, including the other judges.

e. In a debate when several judges are used, the decision given by the majority

of the judges shall be the final decision.

f. Once a ballot has been signed by a judge, no grade or decision on that ballot may be changed, except to correct a recording error.

10. Awards and Participation Certificates.

a. Individual awards shall not be given at sub-district, district, or sectional contests; they shall be given only at the state contest level.

b. District Certificates of Achievement shall be awarded to schools which attain the following success in a district contest or tournament:

Drama A final grade of A.

Debate A record of four wins and two losses, or better,

d. State contest awards shall be determined annually by the Board of Control as to number and kind. Currently the following awards shall be given at the state level:

e. In debate, an alternate on a team which qualifies for individual awards must actually participate in a debate to be eligible for a medal.

f. Certificates of Participation shall be provided by the state office. Any student who participates in a WHSFA sub-district, district, sectional, or state contest is eligible to receive such a certificate. The principal of each school wishing to award Certificates of Participation shall order from the secretary-treasurer, on an order form sent out by the state office, the number and kind of certificates needed; drama, debate, speech.

g. Schools receiving certificates or plaques shall be responsible for entering on them the necessary specific information such as names and dates.

11. Sub-Districts.

a. Each sub-district shall be comprised of no fewer than four schools and no more than six schools. Requests for granting exceptions to this rule may be presented to the Board by district chairmen.

b. The arrangement of sub-districts shall take into account the geographical location of schools, but all schools comprising a sub-district must be within

the same district.

c. Each year no later than October 15, district chairmen shall inform member schools in their district what sub-district they are in for drama and what sub-district for sneech.

d. In conducting sub-district contests the host school shall make all the necessary arrangements and divide the cost of the contest among the participating schools.

*12. Contest Committee.

The contest committee shall determine:

a. the fee for judging

b. the registration fee

c. the order of contestants

Contest Registration Fees.

a. For sub-district, district, and sectional contests the person or persons responsible for the contest shall determine the registration fees.

b. For the state contests the registration fees shall be as follows:

Drama \$35 per school Debate \$40 per school

c. The fees for each contest at the state level shall be paid to the secretarytreasurer when the registration for the contest is sent to the state office.

14. Contest Participation Regulations.

a. In order to participate officially in any WHSFA contest, a school's contestant. team, or play cast must attend the contest in person.

b. In the WHSFA speech contest held in the spring a student may not represent

his school in more than one event in the same year.

c. Beginning with the sub-district, a student may not use the same selection more than one year in any WHSFA speech contest, whether it be in the same event or in another event.

d. In the play acting contest a school may not use the same cutting or scene two successive years, nor may it use a cutting or scene from its production in the drama contest held the same school year.

e. In the drama contest a school may not use the same play nor any part of it

two successive years.

f. In all contests the indentity of contestants' schools shall not be made known to the judges until the contest results are announced. The wearing of distinctive clothing or emblems which would identify the school a contestant represents is prohibited.

g. Member schools may participate with non-member schools in contests other than those sponsored by the Association, but such participation will not qualify contestants for WHSFA Certificates of Participation.

15. Permission and Payment of Royalty.

a. Each member school whose contestants use copyrighted material in a WHSFA contest is responsible for obtaining permission from the publisher to use that material in the contest.

b. Each member school whose contestants use a royalty play or a cutting from a royalty play in a WHSFA contest is responsible for paying the royalty or

obtaining a royalty waiver from the publisher.

16. Speech Contest Competition.

a. In any speech contest, beginning with the sub-district, a school may have no more than two contestants in any contest event, except for play acting in

which one entry of two to five persons in the group is permitted.

b. In sub-district speech contests there shall be at least one round of competition in which each contestant competes. By agreement of all participating schools in the sub-district, the contest may consist of two or three rounds. When there is a single round, a contestant must receive an A to advance to the district contest. When there are two or three rounds, a contestant must receive two A's in order to be awarded a final grade of A in the sub-district contest and thus be eligible for the district contest.

c. In district contests there shall be only one round of competition, in which each contestant participates once. A contestant must receive an A to advance to

the state contest.

d. In the state speech contest there shall be only one round of competition, in which each contestant participates once.

17. Meetings of the Board of Control.

a. Besides meeting annually early in November, the Board shall also hold a regular meeting the first part of May,

b. The agenda for meetings of the Board of Control shall be prepared by the secretary-treasurer and mailed to the Board members no later than two weeks before a meeting.

c. Any item a Board member wishes to have placed on the agenda must be mailed to the secretary-treasurer so it reaches him no later than three weeks before

the meeting.

d. Proposals for changes in the Constitution or Standing Rules must be mailed to the secretary-treasurer so they reach him at least three weeks before the meeting; they will then be distributed with the agenda. Such proposals may be amended at the meeting before action is taken on them.

e. Any item which is not on the distributed agenda can be taken up at the

meeting only if two-thirds of the members present vote to consider it.

f. Changes in contests and contest rules may be introduced at any meeting of the Board, but ordinarily final action will be taken on such proposed changes at the spring meeting. Adopted changes will be published in the next September Newletter.

g. Any changes in contests and contest rules shall go into effect immediately after their adoption, unless otherwise specified. Customarily, such changes are considered to be on a trial basis for two years. If not rescinded at the end of two years by action of the Board, the changes become a regular part of the Standing Rules.

18. Awards by the Board of Control.

a. A framed Certificate of Membership shall be awarded each newly elected Board member at the time he joins the Board of Control.

b. A framed Certificate of Recognition showing the number of years of service shall be awarded each Board member at the time he leaves the Board of Control.

c. A framed Certificate of Recognition for Meritorious Service shall be awarded to selected persons who have made an outstanding contribution to the WHSFA.

II. Supplementary Rules for Drama

- 1. The title and author of the play a school chooses to enter in the drama contest must be sent to the WHSFA district chairman on or before October 1. If the final choice of a play has not been determined by October 1, the names of those in preparation shall be submitted. Any school which fails to comply with this rule by the deadline shall be ineligible to participate in the drama contest that school year.
- *2. A production in the drama contest may be a one-act play or a scene from a longer play. A school may select its play from any source; however, a choice from the WHSFA Play List (recommended plays) is suggested. A school may not use the same play two successive years in the drama contest.

3. Authors of original plays to be entered in the drama contest may send their play manuscripts to the Advisor in Drama for counsel and advice.

4. Each school shall be permitted to enter only one play in a sub-district, district, sectional, or state contest. The same play may be used by more than one school in any given sub-district, district, sectional, or state contest.

5. The major focus of interest in a drama contest entry must be on character relationship, dialogue, and action.

6. Musical dramas may not be entered in the drama contest. Song and dance may be present in a performance but only as incidental elements.

7. Productions which are predominantly choral speaking may not be entered. 8. Productions which are predominantly pageants, spectacles, and dance dramas

may not be entered.

9. An entry in the drama contest shall be a proscenium stage production. Set-up time for each play, at all levels of competition, shall be a uniform 10 minutes. No additional time is allowed for striking the set of the previous play. Production time shall be no more than 35 minutes; there is no minimum time requirement, At the end of 35 minutes, the timekeeper, stationed backstage, shall order the curtain pulled. Stopping the production shall not affect the rating given by a judge.

10. Drama contests at the district, sectional, and state levels shall be judged by three judges. (General Rule 8a.)

11. A school may not advance from one contest level to the next (for example, from sub-district to district) without its play being judged and receiving an A.

12. If a school is the only entry in a sub-district contest, its play must be performed and judged by a judge satisfactory to the WHSFA district chairman. If the play is awarded an A, the school may advance to the district contest.

13. Should a school be the only entry in a district contest, its play must be performed and judged by judges satisfactory to the WHSFA district chairman. If the play

is awarded an A, the school may advance to the sectional contest.

III. Supplementary Rules for Debate

t1. The official WHSFA debate proposition for 1972-73 is; RESOLVED: That governmental financial support for all public elementary and secondary education in the United States should be provided exclusively by the federal government. The general problem area for discussion and debate in 1972-73 is: What should be the policy toward financing elementary and secondary education in the United States?

2. The Forensic Quarterly of the Committee on Discussion and Debate of the National University Extension Association shall be the official handbook of the Association.

3. For district and sectional tournaments and for the first three rounds of the state tournament, each school shall certify in advance of the contest a team for each round of debate. This team shall consist of two affirmative and two negative debaters and may also have one or two alternates. If two, one must be designated affirmative alternate and one negative alternate. The alternates shall attend only those debates in which their team is participating. They may not take part in the debate in any way except in case of illness of a debater. No debater shall participate on both sides in the same district or sectional tournament, nor in the first three rounds of the state tournament.

§4. The order of debating shall be: constructive speeches - affirmative, negative, affirmative, negative; rebuttal speeches—negative, affirmative, negative, affirmative,

a. Constructive speeches shall not exceed ten minutes; rebuttal speeches shall not exceed five minutes.

b. There shall be an official timekeeper for each debate.

c. Time cards shall be used for all contest debates. The timekeeper shall be seated in full view of the debaters, facing them, and shall display time cards to indicate at one-minute intervals the amount of time remaining for each debater. There shall also be a card to indicate when only one half minute remains.

- d. The timekeeper shall rise and remain standing at the full expiration of time for each constructive and rebuttal speech. When the timekeeper rises, the debater shall complete only the sentence already begun. If he continues beyond that sentence the judge shall stop him, but being stopped shall not affect the decision.
- e. The affirmative team shall provide time cards for each debate.
- 6. Judges in debate tournaments are asked to submit brief written comments for each debate on forms provided by the state office.

7. Tournament Procedure.

- a. The order of participation in district and sectional debate contests, as well as in the first three rounds of the state debate tournament, shall be determined by drawing lots at the beginning of the contest.
- b. In the event a debate team is not present at the time of the drawing, the contest manager shall draw for that team.
- c. If a team does not appear by the scheduled starting time, the other debates shall proceed as scheduled. If the tardy team is ready to debate within 15 minutes of the scheduled starting time, it shall be allowed to proceed without prejudice or penalty and with no reduction of time for constructive and rebuttal speeches. If the tardy team is not ready within 15 minutes of the scheduled starting time, it shall forfeit the debate to the opposition.
- d. Unless the contest manager has good reason to believe that a team which failed to appear for the first round will be ready to debate at the start of the second round, he shall, during the first round, re-schedule the succeeding rounds. Ten minutes before the second round he shall post the original schedule if the late team has arrived, or the revised schedule if the late team has not arrived. No change shall be made after the posting of the schedule.
- e. If a late team misses the first two rounds, it shall be ineligible to participate in any succeeding rounds.

8. District Tournaments.

- *a. Each district shall hold a debate tournament of three rounds if there are seven or more schools in the district wishing to compete in debate. If there are fewer than seven such schools, the district chairman shall make arrangements for them to compete with schools in another district. Together, the chairmen of Eau Claire, River Falls, and Superior Districts shall set up no less than two district tournaments in the Northern Section. If the Platteville District has fewer than seven schools in debate, the district chairman shall arrange for those wishing to participate in either the La Crosse or Whitewater District tournaments.
- b. Any school which achieves a record of four wins and two losses, or better, in a district tournament shall be eligible to participate in sectional tournament competition.

9. Sectional Tournaments.

- a. Normally, each section shall hold a debate tournament of three rounds. If fewer than seven schools in the Eau Claire, River Falls, and Superior Districts qualify for sectional competition, only the Central and Southern sectional tournaments will be held, and the eligible schools from districts in the Northern Section shall participate in the Central Section tournament.
- b. Any school which achieves a record of four wins and two losses, or better. in a sectional tournament shall be eligible to participate in the state tournament.

[†]The 1972-73 WHSFA debate proposition was selected through a preferential referendum conducted by the state office last spring. All schools which participated in WHSFA debate competition in 1971-72

10. State Tournament.

- a. There shall be a state tournament, structured to determine a single first-place winner: three qualifying rounds; a run-off round, if necessary, to reduce the number of teams to eight; and three elimination rounds (an eight-team bracket) in which winners advance from quarter-finals, to semi-finals, to finals.
- b. All schools competing in the state tournament shall enter a team of affirmative and negative debaters in the first three rounds of the tournament. Any school which achieves a record of four wins and two losses (4-2), or better, in the first three rounds shall be eligible for further competition.
- c. Each school having a 4-2 record, or better, in the first three rounds shall certify a team of four debaters from which the school's coach may select any two debaters just before the start of any round in the elimination. Debaters may participate on both sides, affirmative and negative, after the three qualifying rounds in the state tournament.
- d. No more than eight schools shall participate in the elimination rounds of the tournament, an eight-team bracket.

Since competition in the elimination rounds is restricted to eight schools, if more than eight have a 4-2 record, or better, in the qualifying rounds, a run-off round shall be held to reduce the number to eight. To determine which schools are to compete in a run-off round, lots shall be drawn by schools with the lowest qualifying records.

- e. If fewer than eight schools have a 4-2 record, or better, some will be given byes. The usual method for determining byes shall be the drawing of lots by schools with the highest record. However, if the number of byes is the same or greater than the number of schools with a 6-0 record, those schools with a 6-0 shall automatically receive byes. Any remaining byes shall be drawn for by schools with the next highest record.
- f. When establishing the eight-team bracket, the following pairings should be avoided whenever possible: the meeting of teams which have met previously in the tournament, the meeting of schools which have met previously in the tournament, and pairing undefeated teams in the quarter-finals.
- g. In the elimination rounds, schools which advance should switch sides each round if possible. When this is impossible, sides shall be assigned by the contest manager, using as a determining factor the number of times a school has dehated on a given side in previous elimination rounds. If both schools have debated each side the same number of times, the decision shall be made by drawing lots. However, if two schools have met previously in the tournament and are scheduled to meet again, they shall be assigned sides opposite those debated in the previous meeting.

- h. In the first three rounds of the state tournament, each debate shall be judged by a single judge. In the quarter-final and semi-final rounds, each debate shall be judged by a panel of three judges. The final round shall be judged by a panel of five judges. (General Rule 8a.)
- i. Coaches are asked not to attend any round of debate at the state tournament except the final round.
- j. A consolation series of debates will be held for teams which do not survive the qualifying rounds.
- k. Debates in the consolation series are to be judged by coaches of teams in the championship bracket, without an honorarium, a single judge for each debate.

IV. Supplementary Rules for Extemporaneous Speaking

- A speech in the extemporaneous speaking contest may be either informative of persuasive in purpose, depending largely on the topic selected. Regardless of the purpose, the speech must be concerned with the topic chosen by the contestant in the drawing.
- 2. An extemporaneous speech shall be no more than eight minutes in length; there is no minimum time requirement. The timekeeper shall use time cards, provided by the host school, to indicate the passage of each minute of time. At the end of eight minutes he shall stand and remain standing, and the contestant may complete the sentence he has begun. If the speaker continues beyond that sentence the judge shall stop him, but being stopped shall not affect his rating.
- 3. The periodicals from which topics will be taken are the January, February, March, and April issues of Newsweek, Time, and U.S. News & World Report. The material a contestant uses may come from sources other than these three magazines.
- 4. The contest manager shall select twenty to thirty topics (not short titles of magazine articles) and write each one on a card. The topics are to be worded either as specific statements or as open-ended questions. One hour before speaking, a contestant shall draw five cards, choose a topic, and return four cards before the next speaker draws. In contests with several sections of extemporaneous speaking, an identical set of topic cards shall be used for each section.
- A contestant may bring to the preparation hour any reference material he wishes, but no prepared speeches or speech outlines.
- *6. The speech, as implied by the title of the contest, is to be presented extemporaneously; and notes limited to both sides of one 4x6 card may, but need not, be used. The host school shall provide uniform, identifiable 4x6 cards, as well as paper for contestants to use in the preparation hour.
- 7. At the conclusion of a speech, the judge may ask the speaker one or more pertinent questions.
- Properties or visual materials may not be used in presenting an extemporaneous speech.

V. Supplementary Rules for Four-minute Speech

- *I. A speech in the four-minute contest may be either informative or persuasive in purpose. The speech is to be written by the student who presents it, and it shall be on any contemporary problem.
- 2. A speech in this contest, as its name implies, shall be no more than four minutes in length; there is no minimum time requirement. At the end of four minutes, the timekeeper (or judge) shall stand and remain standing, and the contestant may complete the sentence he has begun. If he continues beyond that sentence the judge shall stop him, but being stopped shall not affect his rating.
- *3. The four-minute speech may be presented from memory or extemporaneously; and notes limited to both sides of one 4x6 card may, but need not, be used.
- 4. Properties or visual materials may not be used in presenting a four-minute speech.
 *5. A student may not use the same speech more than one school year in four-minute speech, nor may he use it in any other WHSFA contest category.
- *Rule change adopted by the Board of Control at its spring meeting on May 4-5, 1972. In Rule I for Four-minute Speech the words "an event intended especially for novice contestants" were deleted.

VI. Supplementary Rules for Oratory

- 1. A speech in the oratory contest must be persuasive in purpose. The oration is to be written by the student who presents it and may be a problem-solution speech on a contemporary problem, or it may be a eulogy.
- 2. An oration shall be no more than eight minutes in length; there is no minimum time requirement. At the end of eight minutes, the timekeeper (or judge) shall stand and remain standing, and the contestant may complete the sentence he has begun. If he continues beyond that sentence the judge shall stop him, but being stopped shall not affect his rating.
- *3. The oration may be presented from memory or extemporaneously; and notes limited to both sides of one 4x6 card may, but need not, be used.
- 4. Properties or visual materials may not be used in presenting an oration.
- *5. A student may not use the same speech more than one school year in original oratory, nor may he use it in any other WHSFA contest category.

VII. Supplementary Rules for Public Address

- 1. A speech in the public address contest may be either informative or persuasive in purpose, depending largely on the designated topic or specific area, for a particular contest. At each level of competition (sub-district, district, and state) the speech presented must be concerned with the specific area, or topic, designated for that contest. The public address general problem area for 1972-73 is: Are American penal institutions adequately serving society?
 - a. For the sub-district contest the specific area is: What is the proper role of penal institutions in contemporary American society?
 - b. For the district contest the specific area is: To what extent are penal institutions in America fulfilling their proper role?
 - c. For the state contest the specific area is: In what manner, if any, should American penal institutions be reformed?
- 2. A speech in this contest shall be no more than eight minutes in length; there is no minimum time requirement. At the end of eight minutes, the timekeeper (or judge) shall stand and remain standing, and the contestant may complete the sentence he has begun. If he continues beyond that sentence the judge shall stop him, but being stopped shall not affect his rating.
- *3. The speech is to be presented extemporaneously; and notes limited to both sides of one 4x6 card may, but need not, be used.
- 4. Properties or visual materials may not be used in presenting a speech in the public address contest.
- *5. A student may not use the same speech at more than one contest level in a given year, nor may he use it in any other WHSFA contest category.

VIII. Supplementary Rules for Significant Speeches

- *1. A presentation in the significant speeches contest should be chiefly informative in purpose, though it may contain some persuasive elements. The student is to select a single published speech which has historical or contemporary significance, and interpret that speech for his listeners. He shall do this by explanation and by quoting from the speech.
- 2. A presentation in this contest shall be no more than eight minutes in length; there is no minimum time requirement. At the end of eight minutes, the timekeeper (or judge) shall stand and remain standing, and the contestant may complete the sentence he has begun. If he continues beyond that sentence the judge shall stop him, but being stopped shall not affect his rating.
- 3. Part of a presentation in this contest, approximately two to four minutes, should be the student's own writing. This nortion should include pertinent information about the speaker, the audience, and the occasion on which the selected speech

- was given. It should also include an explanation of why the contestant believes the speech was significant for the original audience and why it has significance for persons in his audience. Not to be included in the contestant's presentation is an analysis of such factors as the composition of the selected speech and the speaker's style, since this type of rhetorical criticism is not within the scope and purpose of the significant speeches contest.
- 4. Another part of the presentation should consist of a selected portion, or portions, of the speech chosen by the contestant. The quoted material may be placed wherever the contestant chooses to put it in his presentation. He may intersperse it throughout the presentation if he wishes.
- *5. That portion of the presentation written by the contestant may be given from memory or extemporaneously, but is not to be read. Notes limited to both sides of one 4x6 card may, but need not, be used in delivering that portion of the speech written by the student. The quoted material must be read from a manuscript or from cards.
- Properties or visual materials may not be used in presenting a speech in the significant speeches contest.
- *7. A student may not use the same speech more than one school year in significant speeches, nor may he use it in any other WHSFA contest category.

IX. Supplementary Rules for Declamation

- 1. A presentation in the declamation contest may be a selection or cutting from written prose literature, excluding public speeches. The material the contestant uses may be a selection he has written himself. Whether the selection is original or not, the contestant shall give an introduction he has prepared; he shall also give transitions which are needed to establish a relationship between parts of his presentation.
- 2. A declamation shall be no more than eight minutes in length, including the required introduction and any transitions which the reader gives; there is no minimum time requirement. At the end of eight minutes, the timekeeper (or judge) shall stand and remain standing, and the contestant may complete the sentence he has begun. If he continues beyond that sentence the judge shall stop him, but being stopped shall not affect his rating.
- 3. A presentation in the declamation contest is similar to one in prose reading, except that a declamation is presented from memory instead of from the printed page. In both contest events the student is expected to be an interpreter of written prose, not an actor. For this reason, impersonations from television, records, or tape recordings are not permitted.
- 4. Costumes and properties may not be used in the declamation contest.
 *5. A student may not use the same declamation more than one school year, nor may he use it in any other WHSFA contest category.

X. Supplementary Rules for Play Acting

- 1. An entry in the play acting contest is a presentation of a scene or cutting from a play by a group of two to five contestants. There is no list of approved or prohibited plays for this contest; a choice from the WHSFA Play List (recommended plays) is suggested. The scene selected for production shall be presented without costumes, make-up, lights, or properties other than an available table (or desk as a substitute) and chairs, if required. Hand props as well as stage props, except those mentioned, are not permitted. Music and mechanical or electronic sound effects are also prohibited.
- *2. A presentation in this contest shall not exceed fifteen minutes in length, including a required introduction and any transition(s) the group wishes to make; there is no minimum time requirement. At the end of fifteen minutes the timekeeper (or judge shall stand and remain standing, and the contestant speaking may complete the sentence he has begun. If he continues beyond that sentence the judge shall stop him, but his being stopped shall not affect the rating of the group.
- Each contestant in a play acting group shall portray only one character. In case
 one member of a group is unable to appear at a contest, the coach may substitute
 any other eligible student.

- 4. In play acting, lines are to be spoken from memory and contestants are expected to move as they would in a fully-produced play.
- A school may enter only one group of two to five contestants in the play acting contest event. The regular contest registration fee shall be paid for each student in the group.
- A presentation in this contest shall be judged as a whole, but each contestant shall receive identical individual awards.
- 7. A school may not use the same cutting or scene two successive years, nor may it use a cutting or scene from its production in the drama contest held the same school year.

XI. Supplementary Rules for Poetry Reading

- 1. A presentation in the reading of poetry contest may be a single poem, a cutting from a single poem, or several related poems or cuttings. The material a contestant uses may be poetry he has written himself. Whether the poetry is original or not, the contestant shall give an introduction he has prepared; he shall also give transitions which are needed to establish a relationship between parts of his presentation.
- 2. A reading in this contest shall be no more than eight minutes in length, including the required introduction and any transitions which the reader gives; there is no minimum time requirement. At the end of eight minutes, the timekeeper (or judge) shall stand and remain standing, and the contestant may complete the sentence he has begun. If he continues beyond that sentence the judge shall stop him, but being stopped shall not affect his rating.
- 3. The poetry is to be read from the printed page, with the optional use of a reading stand provided by the contestant. The material is not to be presented as a memorized selection.
- 4. Costumes and properties may not be used in poetry reading.
- *5. A student may not use the same material at more than one contest level in a given year; he must change the material as he advances from sub-district to district, and from district to state. Moreover, he may not use the same material more than one school year, nor may he use it in any other WHSFA contest category.

XII. Supplementary Rules for Prose Reading

- 1. A presentation in the reading of prose contest may be a selection or cutting from prose literature. The material the contestant uses may be a selection he has written himself. Whether the selection is original or not, the contestant shall give an introduction he has prepared; he shall also give transitions which are needed to establish a relationship between parts of his presentation.
- 2. A reading in this contest shall be no more than eight minutes in length, including the required introduction and any transitions which the reader gives; there is no minimum time requirement. At the end of eight minutes, the timekeever (or judge) shall stand and remain standing, and the contestant may complete the sentence he has begun. If he continues beyond that sentence the judge shall stop him, but being stopped shall not affect his rating.
- 3. The prose is to be read from the printed page, with the optional use of a reading stand provided by the contestant. The material is not to be presented as a memorized selection.
- 4. Costumes and properties may not be used in prose reading.
- *5. A student may not use the same material at more than one contest level in a given year; he must change the material as he advances from sub-district to district. and from district to state. Moreover, he may not use the same material more than one school year, nor may he use it in any other WHSFA contest category.

The three publications named were chosen for the extemporaneous speaking contest for a number of reasons, one is their availability. Almost all school libraries subscribe to all three. Furthermore, in some schools they are used as classroom instructional material. Below is information about subscription rates for these magazines.

PART IV

ANNUAL RÉPORT

This section of the WHSFA September Newsletter contains a record of the Association's activities during the past school year. It includes a report of the election of Board members last fall, the financial statement of the state office for 1971-72, and the achievement of contestants in drama, debate, and speech contests last year. The participation summaries on pages 56, 68, and 93 are especially significant. They reveal the large number of students in Wisconsin high schools who derived benefit from the WHSFA program in 1971-72.

BOARD OF CONTROL

There were six positions on the Board of Control which needed to be filled last fall. Three were district chairmanships for three year terms, and one was for one year. A three-year sectional chairmanship also had to be filled.

Mr. N. F. Panzenhagen, Administrator of Cadott Public Schools was re-elected to another full term as chairman of the Eau Claire District. He came to the Board initially in 1967 when he was elected for one year to fill the unexpired term of Mr. Arthur D. Spoolman who had moved out of the Eau Claire District.

Mr. Edwin Sievers, Principal of Viroqua Senior High School was re-elected last fall to another three-year term as chairman of the La Crosse District. He was first elected to the Board in 1964 and has served without interruption every year since that time.

The chairmanship of the Milwaukee District again went to Mr. Raymond Behnke, Principal of Cedarburg High School. Mr. Behnke became the first chairman of the new Milwaukee District in 1969 when it was reconstituted and the new Kenosha District was created. His first term was for two years, a shorter term than usual in order to establish an equitable rotation schedule for the election of Board members.

Mr. Merwin Moen, Administrator of St. Croix Falls Public Schools, was elected chairman of the River Falls District last October. He succeeded Mr. Daryl K. Lien who had been a member of the WHSFA Board of Control for 13 years—from 1943 to 1953 and again from 1968 to 1971.

In the Oshkosh District, Mr. Gaylord K. Unbehaun was elected chairman for one year to complete the unexpired term of Mr. Thomas J. Lynch, Principal of New Holstein High School. Mr. Lynch resigned from the Board in May of 1971 but continued his service to the Association until Mr. Unbehaun was elected.

Last fall Mr. Hintz, teacher and coach at Badger High School in Lake Geneva, was elected chairman of the Southern Section, replacing Mr. J. Peter Shaw of Evansville High School. Mr. Shaw had served for one year, completing the unexpired term of Mr. Norman D. Flynn who had left the teaching profession. Mr. Hintz had been a member of the Board previously, from 1959 to 1962.

During the past school year, regular meetings were held by the Board of Control in November and May. The November meeting was at Holiday Inn No. 1 in Madison. The May meeting, which included a recognition of Dr. Brockhaus' retirement, was at the Quality Motel of Madison. Highlights of these meetings were reported in the November 1971 and May 1972 WHSFA Newsletters.
