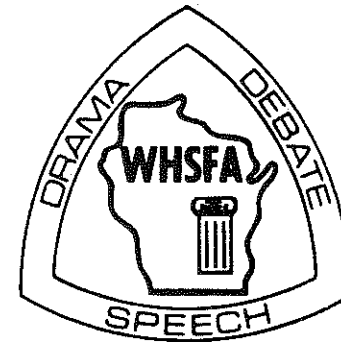

PART I: THE BOARD OF CONTROL

October Board Meeting

The regular meeting of the WHSFA Board of Control was held on October 25-26, 1977, at the Holiday Inn in Stevens Point. Below are the minutes of that meeting.

Agenda Item 1

The meeting was called to order by the chair, George Buckingham, at 7:00 p.m. Members present, in addition to Buckingham, were: Armstrong, Beaver, Behnke, Bennett, Bonikowske, Duesterbeck, Goltry (Advisor in Drama), Hintz, Isaacson (Advisor in Speech), Mickolajak, James La Belle (representing Bill Ott), Renning, Schumacher, Sorensen, Vergin, and Larry Larmer (Secretary-Treasurer).

The meeting was recessed at 9:15 p.m. and reconvened at 9:00 a.m. on October 26. All those present on October 25, except for Vergin, were present on October 26. Larmer presented framed Certificates of Membership to Armstrong, Ott, Mickolajak, Renning, and Schumacher.

Agenda Item 2

Hintz nominated Buckingham for Board chairman for 1977-78. Motion passed unanimously.

Vergin nominated Hintz for Board vice-chairman for 1977-78. Motion passed unanimously.

Agenda Item 3

Bonikowske moved that the minutes of the May 1977 meeting be corrected to include, in the Contest Study Committee report, the possibility of beginning the two-speaker division of the State Debate Tournament on Thursday night. Motion passed.

Beaver moved to accept the minutes as corrected. Motion passed.

Agenda Item 4a

Larmer reminded district chairs that Drama participation reports are to be sent to the State Office after the district Drama contests.

Agenda Item 4b

Larmer reminded Board members of expense reports for the current meeting.

Agenda Item 4c

Larmer announced that those Board members whose terms would expire at the end of the current year (Ott, Beaver, Buckingham, Bonikowske) would be notified by mail and asked whether they want to run for re-election.

Agenda Item 5a

Buckingham moved to accept the auditor's report of the State Office finances for 1976-77 and to commend Shirley Mortenson for her excellence in maintaining the State Office financial records. Motion passed.

Agenda Item 5b

Larmer presented a summary of district and sectional financial records. No action taken.

Agenda Item 5c

Larmer presented a summary of membership for 1977-78. Vergin moved that a committee composed of Behnke (chair), Ott, Hintz, Bonikowske, and Duesterbeck, investigate and report on the feasibility of establishing a Junior High School membership category. Motion passed.

Agenda Item 5d

Larmer reported on relations with University of Wisconsin-Extension.

Agenda Item 5e

Larmer reported that his consultation with life insurance agents regarding coverage of Board members travelling to and from meetings indicated that such coverage was not feasible.

Agenda Item 5f

Larmer reported on State Office finances for 1977-78 to date. Larmer moved to revise the current year's budget by reducing the expense item "Staff Cost" by \$2,300 and adding \$1,000 to "Postage" and \$300 to "Printing" and \$1,000 to "Supplies." Motion passed.

Agenda Item 5g

Hintz reported for the Contest Study Committee.

The Committee recommended that district chairpersons wishing to conduct an "in-service" program for WHSFA spring Speech contest managers should contact the State Office.

The Committee noted that the WHSFA has no affirmative action statement relating to the needs and requirements of physically disabled students. The Secretary-Treasurer was instructed to look into the legal implications of such a statement.

In response to an inquiry regarding judge procedures when a student is disqualified because of a rule violation, the Committee recommended

that students be allowed to finish presentations and that disqualifications not be announced until the judge has consulted with the student's coach, the tournament director, and/or the Referees Committee. The recommendation was accepted by the Board, and it will become a General Rule and will be included in the judges' instructions.

In response to an inquiry regarding the use of a "claque" in a melodrama presentation in the Drama Contest Series, the Committee recommended that the use of a claque be permitted but be regarded as part of the presentation and be included on the Eligibility-Registration forms and in the printed contest program. The Board accepted the Committee's recommendation.

The Committee reported that preparation of the statement of ethics in Debate is still in progress but some preliminary statements will be sent to the Debate schools prior to the current year's district Debate contests.

Hintz reported that the Secretary-Treasurer would conduct a survey of Debate schools to determine whether the two-speaker division of the State Debate Tournament should start on Thursday night.

Hintz reported on the Committee's concern over an obscenity rule. Bennett moved that the Association adopt, as a General Rule, the statement: "The extent to which a participant's, judge's, or audience's sensibilities are abused by profane or obscene language in a selection is a possible point of criticism and evaluation." The motion passed, but enactment will be delayed pending consultation with an attorney by the Secretary-Treasurer.

In response to an inquiry, the Committee clarified that drama--provided it is prose drama--is acceptable material in the Prose category of the spring Speech contest.

In response to an inquiry, the Committee recommended that the Association not outlaw "movement below the neck" in Prose and Poetry categories of the Speech contest. The Board accepted the Committee's recommendation.

Hintz reported that issuing a statement regarding the definition of A's, B's, and C's in spring Speech, devising an approach to judge certification in spring Speech, and the establishment of school awards at state Speech are still under study.

Agenda Item 6a

Hintz moved that Duesterbeck be designated as delegate and Bonikowske as alternate to the NUEA Committee on Discussion and Debate December, 1977, meeting in Atlanta. Motion passed.

Agenda Item 6b

The issue of providing a three-week interval between the latest date for subdistrict Speech and district Speech was discussed. No action was taken.

Agenda Item 6c

Behnke was appointed to the Referee's Committee for the State Debate Tournament to replace Bill O'Brien.

Agenda Item 6d

Sorensen moved to deny the request for funding from the Wisconsin Council for Gifted and Talented Youths. Motion passed.

Agenda Item 6e

The issue of changing the approach to dues assessment to accommodate schools wishing to enter only one WHSFA contest series was discussed. No action was taken.

Agenda Item 6f

The possible conflict between latest date for subdistrict Drama and the WEA Convention was discussed. Since conflicts appeared to be few, no action was taken.

Agenda Item 6g

Beaver moved that the site of the 1979 State Debate Tournament be University of Wisconsin-Stevens Point. Motion passed.

Agenda Item 7

Beaver moved that the May 4-5, 1978, meeting of the Board be in Stevens Point. Motion failed.

Sorensen moved that the May 4-5, 1978, meeting of the Board be in Oshkosh. Motion passed.

Buckingham reported on his involvement with the WIAA long-range planning committee. Sorensen moved that the Board convene a special meeting to consider impending issues in the philosophy and direction of secondary school forensics. Motion passed. The site of the meeting was selected as Stevens Point and the date will be Saturday, January 28, and Sunday, January 29, 1978.

Agenda Item 8

The meeting was adjourned at 12:15 p.m.

At last in a final escape from the squalor around him, he takes an overdose of narcotics and ends his search.

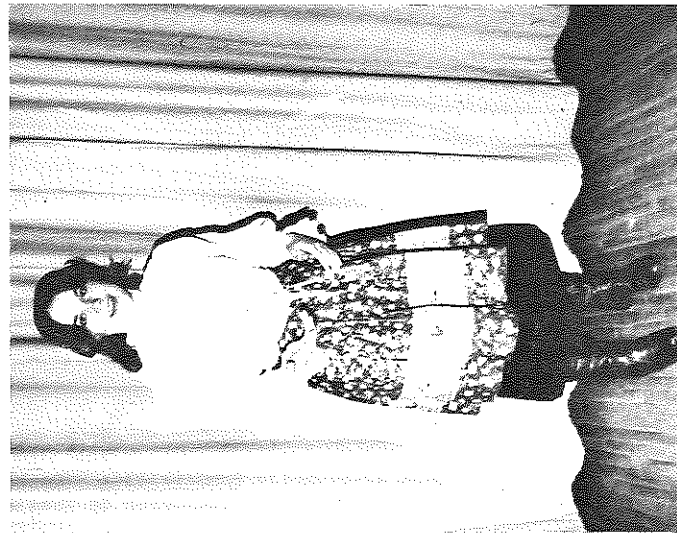

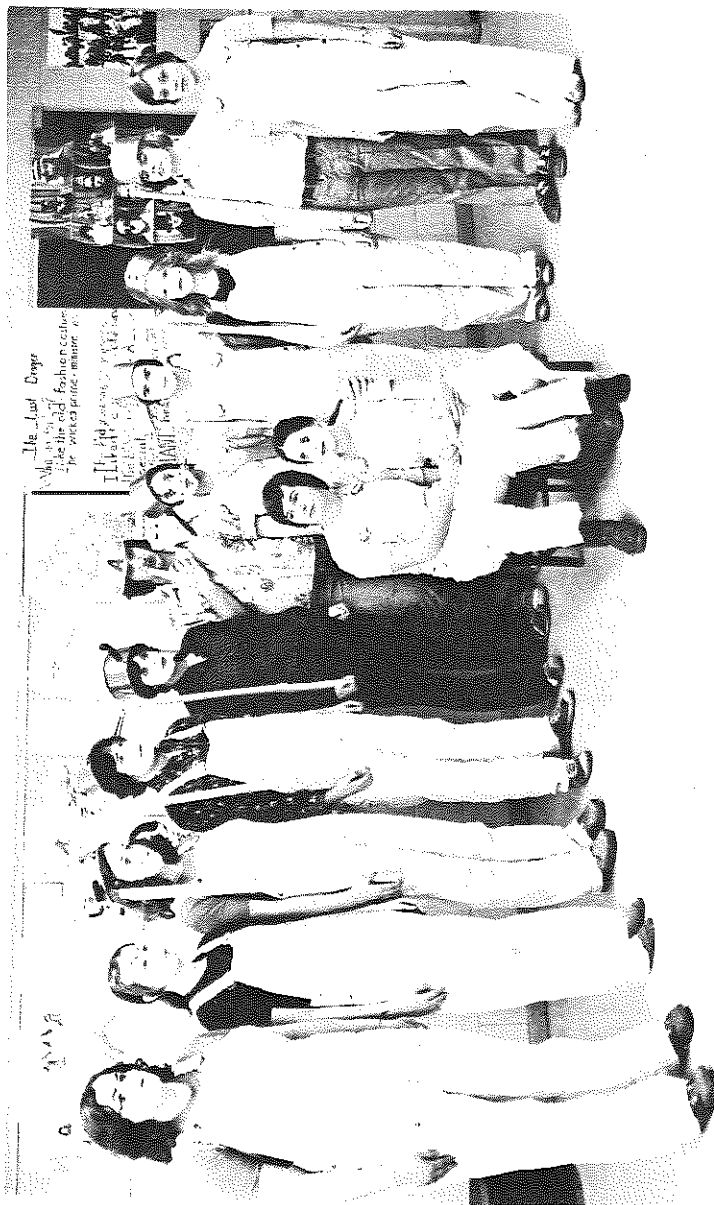

PART V: PROFESSIONAL INTEREST

"A Report on the State Speech School Award Proposal"

During the past year, the WHSFA Board of Control and Contest Study Committee have been considering a proposal to enact a "school award" at the State Speech Contest. As currently envisioned, the award would work this way: Each school would receive 3 points for each "A" its entrants received, 2 points for each "B," and 1 point for each "C." Total points would be calculated and all schools tied with the highest number would receive awards--probably engraved plaques.

The motivation for the idea was to add a dimension of significance to the State Speech Contest which several member schools thought was needed. To Contest Study Committee members, the school award idea seemed preferable to a plan for determining single winners. The school award seemed a way to recognize a school's breadth of participation as well as its quality.

The idea was put to a preliminary vote of the membership on the recent general questionnaire distributed by the State Office. The results generally tend to discourage pursuing the school award. The overall vote, calculating the responses of administrators and teachers together, 165 favored the idea, 197 opposed it, and 23 reported no opinion. Administrators overall favored the idea by a one-vote margin (54-53), excluding the 3 "no opinions." At the district level, the idea was endorsed by both administrators and teachers in the Kenosha, Milwaukee, and Superior districts. It was favored by administrators and opposed by teachers in the Eau Claire, La Crosse, Oshkosh, and Whitewater districts.

The most frequent reason given for opposing the school award was that it was feared that small schools would not have a fair chance. The State Office did some tabulation to discover who would have won the awards in each of the last three years if it had been available. That tabulation is reported below. The top-ten schools in each of the last three years are presented along with each school's size and its WHSFA district.

The interpretation of the data is up to the reader. Some may be surprised to see that some relatively small schools do come in rather high on the lists. Others may see general confirmation that larger schools outnumber smaller schools in each year's "top ten." It remains a matter of speculation regarding what would happen if the award actually existed and both large and small schools actively pursued it.
