WELCOME TO MEMBERSHIP

If your school is like most high schools in Wisconsin, it has already joined the WHSFA for 1970-71. This past July we mailed out membership registration cards to all schools which belonged to the Association last year. A large majority have renewed their membership by returning the cards to us along with their current dues.

In the back of this Newsletter you will find a roster of the 458 schools which comprised the Wisconsin High School Forensic Association last year. The roster not only gives the names of member schools but also identifies the district in which they are located and cites the number of years they have held membership. In this 45th anniversary year of the WHSFA, it is interesting to look at the roster and discover which schools were members of the organization the year of its founding. The number 45 after a school's name identifies most of the charter members. They are schools which have held uninterrupted membership in the Association since 1925.

Membership in the Association is open to all schools in Wisconsin, public or private. which offer work at the 9th, 10th, 11th, or 12th grade levels, Junior high schools as well as senior high schools may join, but only their 9th grade students may compete in WHSFA contests.

The primary function of the Association, without a doubt, is to conduct the major inter-school forensic contest program in the state. However, the purpose of this program is not simply to name winners. More important is the educational experience gained by the thousands of Wisconsin high school students who participate in debate, drama, and speech contests each year. The participation summaries for 1969-70 on pages 50, 62, and 84 in this Newsletter are revealing. The large number of participants, especially at the local level, should dispel any fear that the WHSFA program benefits only a select few.

The nature and quality of the Association's program is the concern of the WHSFA Board of Control. This elected group which determines the policies of the Association is comprised of 14 educators. Eleven are high school principals or administrators who serve as chairmen of the 11 districts. Three are speech teachers or coaches who function as chairmen of the three sections. As Board members these 14 people establish the policies and rules of the Association. As chairmen of districts and sections they administer those policies and rules which apply to their particular areas.

The principal administrative officer of the WHSFA is the secretary-treasurer, who is responsible for the state office of the Association. He is a faculty member employed by University Extension, which also provides the space and equipment for the office. The WHSFA contributes \$7,500 annually toward the salaries of the secretary-treasurer and the state office stenographer.

Each membership year in the Association begins on September I and ends on August 31. Annual dues are payable on or before October 1. The schedule of dues adopted by the Board at its meeting in May 1969 is as follows:

\$25 for schools with an enrollment of 149 or less


\$35 for schools with an enrollment of 150 to 349

\$40 for schools with an enrollment of 350 or more

Money collected in dues is used for a variety of purposes. It pays for: expenses of Board meetings and committee meetings; part of the salaries of the secretarytreasurer and the stenographer in the state office; publication of four issues of the Newsletter, the Contest Handbook, Play List, and other special pamphlets; purchase of materials for use in contests, especially debate; and the cost of mailing publications and materials to the member schools.

We hope you consider the activities of the Association to be a worthwhile part of your school program. We will be pleased to see the name of your school on the 1970-71 membership roster of the Wisconsin High School Forensic Association.

ANNIVERSARY YEAR — 1970-71

This year, 1970-71, is the diamond anniversary of organized high school forensics in Wisconsin. Seventy-five years ago the High School Lyceum Association of Wisconsin was founded, the first state organization of its kind.

This year is also the 45th anniversary of the Wisconsin High School Forensic Association, which grew out of the Lyceum Association. Therefore it is appropriate that 1970-71 be designated as our Anniversary Year.

A brief account of the origin of the WHSFA and the organization which preceded it was written by the first Chairman of the WHSFA Board of Control, George J. Balzer, and published in the first printed newsletter of the Association in 1928-29. It was headed HISTORICAL. Since Mr. Balzer's writing is now a part of Wisconsin High School Forensic Association history, what better time to reprint it than this Anniversary Year.

"The present Wisconsin High School Forensic Association had its inception in 1895, when W. H. Schultz, one of Wisconsin's able and outstanding school men, organized the High School Lyceum of Wisconsin, an organization which was the first state high school forensic association in the United States. W. H. Schultz served as president or as secretary of the association until he left our state in 1916. In 1914, Professor W. P. Roseman of La Crosse became the state president and served the State Lyceum Association until 1925.

"In 1925 a group of high school principals met at the time of the state teachers' association and elected a committee to revise the rules which were governing the Wisconsin High School Lyceum Association and to draw up a constitution. This committee consisting of Otto A. Birr, R. J. MacMahon, R. F. Lewis, A. J. Henkel, and George J. Balzer, made its report to the state high school principals' association in the fall of 1926. A constitution and a new set of rules and regulations was adopted and the name of the association changed to its present name. The new association was received by the University of Wisconsin Extension Division and became an activity of that University Department.

"The plan of organization of the present association differs but slightly from that of the parent organization. The purpose of the new organization is the same as that which prompted W. H. Schultz to organize the State Lyceum, namely, to create an interest in the high school boys and girls in the state in oratory, declamations, extemporaneous speaking and reading, and debate, and to serve as a means to direct contests in those events among the high schools of our state.

"The contest feature of the association is only a means unto an end. The real object of the association is to enlist the high schools in Wisconsin in forensic activities and as such give the high school pupils of our state a training in speaking before an audience, an asset which will serve a boy or girl for life, and an accomplishment which will go a long ways towards assisting any citizen to render public service to the state.

"That the interest in forensic work in the high schools of our state is large and that it is increasing is evident from the steadily increasing school membership in the state association.

The continued growth of the Wisconsin High School Forensic Association is reported in the yearly membership figures on the next to the last page of this Newsletter.

Numerous factors are responsible for the expansion of the WHSFA since its founding in 1925, but none is more significant than the affiliation of the Association with the University Extension Division and the stability and leadership this connection provided. Even before the founding of the WHSFA, University Extension contributed to the program of high school forensics under the old Lyceum Association.

Professor Roseman, mentioned by Mr. Balzer as having been president of the State Lyceum Association from 1914 to 1925, was the District Representative of the University Extension Division, at La Crosse. Upon becoming president, Professor Roseman consulted with Lewis Reber, Dean of the University Extension Division; Professor W. Lighty of the Correspondence Study Department; and Miss Almere L. Scott of the Department of Debating and Public Discussion. It was decided to have the secretarial work of the Lyceum Association done through the Extension Division. As reported by Professor Roseman in a personal letter, "Mr. Lighty and Miss Scott were to share the responsibility, particularly in budgetary matters. Miss Scott's Department did most of the correspondence work however."

Having the University Extension Division look after the secretarial and business affairs of the Lyceum was an arrangement which Professor Roseman believed had merit, and it was not long before he recommended an even closer relationship. In fact, he proposed that the Extension Division take over the Lyceum as one of its activities. As he himself explained it, "In 1916 or there-abouts, I suggested that the Extension Division assume entire responsibility for the so called Lyceum work, carried on in the State. Prof. Lighty and Miss Scott were willing to assume the responsibility but Dean Reber decided it would be better to have the high school principals set up a control organization to carry on the secretarial work."

The recommendation by Dean Reber became a fact when the constitution of a newly organized Wisconsin High School Forensic Association was adopted unanimously on November 5, 1925 by the Principals' Section of the Wisconsin State Teachers Association. This constitution provided that "the Director of the Department of Debating and Public Discussion of the University Extension Division of the University of Wisconsin shall be the Secretary of the Board of Control." Thus Miss Almere Scott, who gave much to high school forensics under the Lyceum Association, became the first executive secretary of the WHSFA. She continued to exert strong, dedicated leadership until her retirement in 1945, one year prior to her death.

Miss Scott was succeeded as Director of the Department of Debating and Public Discussion by Mr. Leslie E. Brown, who, by virtue of his position, became Secretary of the WHSFA. Mr. Brown held this post until 1948 when he left the University of Wisconsin to accept an administrative position in adult education at Western Reserve University in Cleveland, Ohio. He is now Professor Emeritus of Adult Education at Case Western University.

When Mr. Brown left the University Extension Division, his position was filled by Mr. Robert H. Schacht. The name of the department he directed was changed to Bureau of Information and Program Services; and the title of his position with the WHSFA, to Secretary-Treasurer. While serving the Extension Division and the WHSFA, Mr. Schacht continued graduate work and was granted the Ph.D. degree in 1957. Two years later, in 1959, the Wisconsin High Schol Forensic Association was transferred within the Extension Division from the Bureau of Information and Program Services to the Extension Department of Speech. Dr. Schacht gave up his Forensic Association post but continued on the staff of University Extension; he now is Director of Madison Programs and Special Projects, and Director of Wisconsin Alumni Seminars.

In 1959, Mr. Frederick E. Haug, Jr. assumed the position of WHSFA Secretary-Treasurer after having been the assistant officer the previous year. As an instructor in the Extension Speech Department, he also taught in adult education programs while continuing his graduate studies. He received the Ph.D. degree in January 1965 and left the University of Wisconsin the following September to go to the Wisconsin State University-Eau Claire. At that institution he is now Associate Dean of the School of Arts and Sciences, and Professor of Speech.

With Dr. Haug's resignation in 1965, Dr. Herman H. Brockhaus, Chairman of the Speech Department in University Extension, assumed the duties of the WHSFA

Secretary-Treasurer. Doing so required an adjustment of responsibilities, including his resignation as Chairman of the Department of Speech in the University Center System. Besides being Chairman of the Extension Department of Speech, Dr. Brockhaus is Chairman of the Communication Arts Unit in Extension and Professor of Communication Arts in the College of Letters and Science of the University of Wisconsin, Madison.

During the 45 years of its existence, the Wisconsin High School Forensic Association has had five executive secretaries. Over the years, the organization has experienced continued growth and progress. Contributing to its continuity is the uninterrupted service of Mrs. Lois Sheehan, who has been the office secretary for the WHSFA since 1944. Having begun her employment with University Extension under Miss Scott, she has been of invaluable assistance to all five administrative officers of the Association. Since Mrs. Sheehan has been with the WHSFA for exactly 26 years, 1970-71 is an anniversary year for her as well as for the Wisconsin High School Forensic Association.

GENERAL INFORMATION

ANNUAL DUES MUST BE PAID ON OR BEFORE OCTOBER 1. THE BOARD OF CONTROL HAS RULED THAT A SCHOOL WHICH FAILS TO PAY ITS DUES BY OCTOBER 1 MAY NOT PARTICIPATE IN ANY ASSOCIATION ACTIVITY.

Membership Registration

Last July each school which was a member of the WHSFA in 1969-70 was sent a set of membership registration cards and a statement requesting payment of dues. When the filled-in cards are received by the state office, one copy is filed and the other is forwarded to the district chairman. Thus both the state office and the district chairman have information about the contest activities a school plans to enter, the names of the coaches in charge, and the payment of dues. The cards are also used in the preparation of state and district mailing lists.

At the start of the school year, members receive the following materials from the state office:

WHSFA Newsletters

The state office publishes a Newsletter each year in September, November, February, and May. The September issue contains a record of the previous year's activities, a copy of the constitution of the Association, and the rules under which the contests are conducted. The other three issues include current news items, announcements, and contributed articles.

Districts and Sections

For information about sub-district or district contests, schools are advised to write or phone their district chairman. For information about sectional contests, they should communicate directly with their sectional chairman. The secretary-treasurer of the Association is the person to write or phone concerning state contests.

The district directory in the front part of this Newsletter and the roster of schools in the back show the districts to which members belong. The names, addresses, and phone numbers of the district and sectional chairmen are on the inside front cover.

Elections of Board Members

The normal schedule for electing persons to the 14-member Board of Control is to have five people elected each fall, except for every third year when four are chosen. Of the Board members elected each year, one is a speech teacher or coach, who serves as a sectional chairman. The others are high school principals or school administrators, who function as district chairmen. Board members are elected for three-year terms by schools within the district or section. District chairmen and sectional chairmen may be re-elected.

In October 1970 it will be necessary to hold elections in the following districts and sections for the terms indicated:

Dr. Joseph P. Schwei, Principal of West Milwaukee High School, served as chairman of the newly created Kenosha District last year. In doing so he filled the unexpired term of Mr. Walter J. Mountin, chairman of the former Milwaukee District. At the Board meeting last May, Dr. Schwei stated he would not be a candidate for re-election in October.

Mr. J. C. Gillmann, Administrator of Marathon Public Schools, has been chairman of the Stevens Point District since 1956. Besides being a district chairman, he is also chairman of the Board of Control. Mr. Gillmann has consented to be a candidate for another term.

Mr. Frank Cirilli, Principal of Superior Senior High School, was elected to the chairmanship of the Superior District in 1968 to fill the unexpired term of Mr. Gordon Nelson who resigned for health reasons. Mr. Cirilli told the Board he would be a candidate again in October 1970.

Mrs. Marylou Patterson, speech teacher and coach at Memorial High School in Eau Claire, has been chairman of the Northern Section since 1964. At the meeting of the Board last spring she said she would be a candidate for re-election this fall.

Sister Ann Marie Trimberger, teacher and coach at Pius XI High School in Milwaukee, was appointed as interim chairman of the Southern Section last spring. Her appointment grew out of the resignation of Mr. Norman D. Flynn, who chose to leave the teaching profession at the close of the school year. The WHSFA constitution provides that the chairmanship of a district or section shall be declared vacant when the incumbent leaves the profession. It also requires the appointment of a temporary chairman to fill the vacancy until the next annual election. Sister Ann Marie consented to serve the Association as an interim chairman. In the October election a teacher or coach in the Southern Section will be elected for one year to fill Mr. Flynn's unexpired term.

Calendar of Contest Dates

A five-year calendar of WHSFA contest dates is published in the front section of this Newsletter. This calendar was approved by the Board of Control last spring and differs from previous five-year calendars in one important respect. All dates except those for sub-district contests are firm dates. District, sectional and state contests will be held on the dates designated. The dates shown for sub-district competition are the latest dates on which sub-district contests may be held.

By fixing firm dates for district, sectional, and state WHSFA contests and publishing those dates five years in advance, it is hoped that conflicts with other activities may be avoided or reduced. Conflicts with the state speech contest in April are especially critical because of the large number of contestants involved and because of the distances some students must travel.

Drama Contest

To help drama directors in their search for plays for the fall drama contest, the state office again has published and distributed to all member schools a *Play List* which gives the titles of recommended plays. This advisory type of list is consistent with the WHSFA policy of permitting a school to use any play it wishes in the drama contest.

Any school expecting to enter the drama contest this fall must send to its WHSFA district chairman by October I the name and author of the play it has chosen for the contest. If the final choice of play has not been determined by October I, the names of those in preparation are to be sent in. In previous years this information was mailed to the state office which forwarded it to district chairman. Beginning this fall it is to be sent directly to the WHSFA district chairman. Any school which does not meet the October I deadline will be ineligible to praticipate in the drama contest, according to a supplementary rule for drama.

Several new rules governing the drama contest were adopted by the Board of Control at its meeting last May. These rules prohibit a school from using the same play two successive years, using a musical drama, or using a production which is predominantly choral speaking. All the rules for the drama contest will be found in this Newsletter under Contest Regulations in the General Rules, and in the Supplementary Rules for Drama.

Debate Contest

OFFICIAL WHSFA DEBATE PROPOSITION FOR 1970-71

RESOLVED: That the federal government should establish, finance, and administer programs to control air and water pollution in the United States.

As in previous debate seasons, the four issues of *The Forensic Quarterly*, published by the Committee on Discussion and Debate of the National University Extension Association, will be sent to all schools planning to enter debate this year. The quarterlies are purchased from the Committee by the state office and are distributed at no cost to member schools which plan to take part in debate. Other materials which are received from the Committee on Discussion and Debate will also be mailed to those schools which indicate on their membership registration card an intention to participate in debate.

The WHSFA debate competition consists of district tournaments, sectional tournaments, and a state tournament. The structure of the state tournament provides for the selection of a single first-place winner, a second-place winner, and two third-place winners. In addition, there is a consolation series in the state tournament, for teams which do not survive the qualifying rounds. All the regulations which appply to the WHSFA debate contest are given in this Newsletter under the heading Supplementary Rules for Debate and under Contest Regulations, Section 7 of the General Rules.

Speech Contest

The spring forensic program is the largest activity sponsored by the WHSFA. It provides thousands of students an opportunity to participate in a variety of events and compete with talent from the entire state. Many schools hold local contests to select contestants who represent them in WHSFA competition at the sub-district, district, and state levels.

Detailed information about the different spring speech events will be found in the WHSFA Contest Handbook, two copies of which are mailed to each member school. Specific rules for each event are published in this Newsletter in the supplementary rules for each contest.

Speech Institutes

Universities and colleges in Wisconsin support the program of the Wisconsin High School Forensic Association in a number of ways. The departments of speech, communication, and theatre in several of them sponsor institutes and workshops for high school students and coaches.

Shown below are those institutes reported to the state office in response to an inquiry sent out last spring. Included is a workshop sponsored by the Wisconsin Debate Coaches Association. If you decide to take your students to a particular institute, write to the person in charge of the program for detailed information. Do not assume you will automatically receive announcements from the host institution or group. Your school may not be on the mailing list used by the sponsoring organization.

Independent Debate Tournaments

Besides the WHSFA debate competition, there are a large number of independent tournaments for high school debaters in Wisconsin. These not only provide additional experience but often afford training in a different type of debating, particularly cross examination. Although the Board of Control has decided that the standard debate format should be used in WHSFA tournaments, it commends the use of other forms in other competition.

The following is a calendar of independent tournaments scheduled for the 1970-71 school year. Included in the list are all those tournaments reported to the state office in response to inquiries which were sent out. The schedule prepared by the Wisconsin Debate Coaches Association is incorporated in the following calendar.

In the listing of a tournament, information given in parentheses indicates the level of competition: V for varsity debaters, JV for junior varsity, and N for novice. The type of debating is also identified: Stand means standard or the traditional form of four constructive speeches followed by four rebuttal speeches; Cross Ex stands for cross examination.

Some of the tournaments listed are open to all schools wishing to participate, while others are invitational contests. Before making plans to take debaters to any of the tournaments in the schedule which follows, it would be well to write to the person in charge of the particular program for further information about the event.

Part II

GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS

CONSTITUTION OF THE WISCONSIN HIGH SCHOOL FORENSIC ASSOCIATION

Article I. Name

The name of this organization shall be the Wisconsin High School Forensic Association.

Article II. Purpose

The purpose of this organization shall be:

- a. to promote forensic activities in the high schools of Wisconsin.
- b. to stimulate an interest in dramatics, debate, and other forms of speech work.
- c. to improve the quality of high school speech work.
- d. to provide channels for inter-school activity in forensics.

Article III. Membership

Section 1. Any public or private high school in Wisconsin may become a member by making written application to the secretary-treasurer of the Board of Control and paying the annual dues.

Section 2. Any public high school in Upper Michigan will be admitted to membership by making written application to the secretary-treasurer of the Board of Control and paying the annual dues, provided:

- a. its application is approved by a majority of the member schools in the district to which such school requests to be assigned.
- b. membership of such applicant be limited to affiliation with one state organization.
- c. the application has the approval of the Michigan High School Forensic Association Council.

SECTION 3. The annual dues shall be determined by the Board of Control. The membership year shall be from September 1 to August 31.

Article IV. Administration

Section 1. Officers.

- a. The officers of the Association shall be 11 district chairmen and three sectional chairmen. These 14 officers shall be the Board of Control of the Association.
- b. The officers of the Board of Control shall be a chairman and a secretary-treasurer.
- c. The chairman shall be elected annually by the Board of Control for a term of
- d. The secretary-treasurer shall be a member of the University Extension Department of Speech of the University of Wisconsin. The secretary-treasurer shall be the principal administrative officer of the Association.

Section 2. Board of Control.

- a. The affairs of the Association shall be administered by the Board of Control.
- b. The district chairmen shall be school administrators, elected by the member schools of their respective districts. Each district chairman shall be responsible for conducting forensic affairs of his district in accordance with Association regulations. Each district chairman shall make reports of the district contests to the secretarytreasurer.

- c. Each district chairman shall organize for his district an executive committee, consisting of:
 - (1) one representative from a Wisconsin State University, and
 - (2) one high school principal, and
 - (3) two coaches or teachers of speech.
- d. The three sectional chairmen shall be speech coaches elected by the member schools of their respective sections. Each sectional chairman shall be responsible for conducting forensic affairs of his section. Each sectional chairman shall report promptly the results of his sectional contests to the secretary-treasurer.
- The term of office of the members of the Board shall be three years, or until a successor is elected. The term of office of members of the Board of Control shall begin on the date on which the election is completed.
- f. The office of chairman of any district or section shall be declared vacant when the incumbent of that office:
 - (1) moves to another district or section, or

(2) leaves the profession, or

- (3) absents himself from two consecutive board meetings without a reason acceptable to a majority of the Board.
- g. In case of a vacancy in a district or sectional chairmanship the remaining memhers of the Board of Control shall appoint a chairman to serve until the next annual election.
- h. The duties of the Board of Control shall be to direct generally all the affairs of the Association and to enact the rules which shall govern the activities of the
- i. The Board shall meet annually as soon as convenient after the annual election of district and sectional chairmen. Seven members of the Board shall constitute
- Special meetings of the Board may be called by the chairman or by the secretarytreasurer, or must be called by the secretary-treasurer upon request of any five members of the Board of Control.

Section 3. Sections, Districts, and Sub-Districts.

a. For administrative purposes the state shall be divided into sections and districts as follows:

Superior District

Central Section

Green Bay District

La Crosse District

Oshkosh District

Stevens Point District

- b. Any school may transfer from one district to another by securing written approval from the Board of Control.
- c. The chairman of a district shall be empowered to set up sub-districts in his district, all schools within a sub-district being members of the same district. In setting up sub-districts the chairman shall consult with the executive committee of his district.

Section 4. Elections.

a. Each member school shall be entitled to one vote for its district chairman, one vote for its sectional chairman and one on any question submitted for a referendum.



- b. The election of district chairmen shall be conducted in the following manner:
 - (1) The primary election. On or before September 15, the secretary-treasurer shall mail a primary ballot to each member school in the districts in which a chairman is to be elected. Each member school may nominate one administrator for district chairman. Primary ballots shall be returned to the secretary-treasurer on or before October 1. The two administrators who receive the highest number of votes shall be declared the nominees for that district. In case of a tie for second place on the primary ballots, all persons so tied shall be considered nominees. If any nominee receives a majority of the primary votes cast in a district, such nominee shall be declared elected by the secretary-treasurer.

(2) Final ballot. On or before October 10, the secretary-treasurer shall mail a final ballot to each member school in the districts in which a chairman is to be elected. The ballot shall list the nominees in alphabetical order. Final ballots shall be returned to the secretary-treasurer on or before October 20. The nominee receiving the highest number of votes on the final ballot shall be declared elected. In case of a tie, the chairman of the Board shall appoint a disinterested person to determine the election by lot.

c. The election of the sectional chairmen shall be conducted by the secretary-treasurer in a manner corresponding to the method of election of district chairmen.

Article V. Constitution and Standing Rules

Section 1. The articles governing the Association shall be the Constitution and the Standing Rules.

Section 2. Amendments.

a. Amendments to the Constitution may be initiated by the Board of Control at any regular or special meeting, or by the secretary-treasurer upon petition from 25 member schools.

Ratification of Amendments. After being initiated as required above, a proposed amendment must be submitted to a referendum of all member schools. Ballots must be returned within 30 days after being mailed by the secretary-treasurer. If approved by a majority of schools voting in the referendum, the proposed amendment must be ratified at the next regularly scheduled meeting of the Board of Control in order to be declared adopted. Any adopted amendment to the Constitution shall be published in the next issue of the WHSFA Newsletter.

SECTION 3. Standing Rules.

The Standing Rules may be changed or amended by a majority vote of the Board of Control at any regular or special meeting.

STANDING RULES

I. General Rules

1. Membership.

The membership year of the Association shall begin on September 1. The annual dues must be paid on or before October 1. A school which fails to pay its dues by October 1 may not participate in any Association activity.

2. Student Eligibility.

- a. Any bona fide pupil who is in regular attendance in the 9th, 10th, 11th, or 12th grade, and not beyond the 8th semester of high school, is eligible to compete in Association activities, provided that he or she:
 - (1) has been taking not less than 20 hours of regular school work from the first 15 days of the semester in which the contest is scheduled, and
 - (2) has an average standing for all school work equal at least to a passing mark, with not more than one grade below passing, irrespective of the number of classes carried, and

(3) has earned at least three credits during the last semester in which he attended school. b. Student eligibility blanks must be sent to the chairman one week prior to each sub-district contest, or to the chairman of the first contest beyond the local contest.

3. Coaches.

Drama, debate, and speech coaches must be licensed teachers of the school.

. Dues.

The dues structure for 1970-71 shall be:

\$25 for schools with an enrollment of 149 or less \$35 for schools with an enrollment of 150 to 349 \$40 for schools with an enrollment of 350 or more

5. Contests.

The Association shall sponsor the following contest activities:

- a. Drama
- b. Debate
- c. Speech

Extemporaneous Speaking
Four-minute Speech
Original Oratory
Public Address
Significant Speeches
Interpretative Reading of Poetry
Interpretative Reading of Prose
Memorized Declamation
Play Acting

6. Contest Committee.

The contest committee shall determine:

- a. the fee for judging
- b, the admission fee
- c. the registration fee
- d. the order of contestants, except that insofar as possible it be by the drawing of lots

7. Contest Regulations.

a. Each sub-district shall be comprised of no fewer than four schools and no more than six schools. Requests for granting exceptions to this rule may be presented to the Board by district chairmen.

b. The arrangement of sub-districts shall take into account the geographical location of schools, but all schools comprising a sub-district must be within the

same district.

*c. Each year no later than October 15, district chairmen shall inform member schools in their district what sub-district they are in for drama and what sub-district for speech.

d. In conducting sub-district contests the host school shall make all the necessary arrangements and divide the cost of the contest among the participating schools.

e. The maximum number of contestants each school may enter in each event of sub-district speech contests shall be two, except in play acting where one entry of two to five persons in the cast may be made by each participating school.

f. No school or contestant may participate in any official contest of the Association without actually attending the contest in person.

- *g. A school may not use the same play two successive years in the drama contest. In the play acting contest a school may not use the same cutting or scene two successive years, nor may a school use a cutting or scene from its production in the drama contest of the previous fall. A student may not use the same selection more than one year in any WHSFA speech contest, whether it be in the same event or in another event. This rule applies to sub-district, district, sectional (drama), and state competition.
- h. In all WHSFA contests the identity of contestants' schools shall not be revealed to the judges until the contest results are announced. The wearing of distinctive clothing or emblems which would identify the school which a contestant represents is prohibited.

- i. No student shall represent his school in the same year in more than one event of the spring speech contest.
- j. Participants awarded A in the spring speech contests (beginning with the sub-district) are eligible to proceed to the next contest. The order of contests shall be sub-district, district and state.
- k. Schools awarded A in the drama contests (beginning with the sub-district) are eligible to proceed to the next contest. The order of contests shall be sub-district, district, sectional and state.
- *(1) No school may advance from one contest level to another (for example, from sub-district to district, or from district to sectional) without its play being judged and receiving an A.
- *(2) If a school is the only entry in a sub-district contest, its play must be performed and judged by a judge satisfactory to the WHSFA district chairman. If the play is awarded an A, the school may advance to the district contest.
- *(3) Should a school be the only entry in a district contest, its play must be performed and judged by judges satisfactory to the WHSFA district chairman. If the play is awarded an A, the school may advance to the sectional contest.
- Member schools may participate with non-member schools, but such participation shall not be considered in the determination of eligibility for Certificates of Participation.
- m. Each school entering debate competition sponsored by the Association must participate in a district tournament.

8. Judges and Judging.

a. Each contest shall be judged by one or more judges. By agreement of the majority of the participating schools, the coaches may act as judges of these contests. No coach shall judge his own contestants. The judge or judges shall grade each play in a drama contest A, B, or C, and shall grade each participant in a speech contest A, B, or C, according to merit, possibly having several of the same grade or none of some grades. All those graded A shall be eligible to go on to the next contest. If several judges are used, the mean of their ratings shall be the final grade. In judging a debate the judge shall declare which of the teams, affirmative or negative, won the debate.

9. State Contest Registration Fees.

a. The registration fees for the state contests shall be as follows:

b. The fees for each state contest shall be paid to the secretary-treasurer when the registration for that contest is made.

†10. Awards.

- a. Individual awards shall not be given at the sub-district, district, or sectional levels of any WHSFA contest.
- b. Any student who participates in a WHSFA sub-district, district, sectional, or state contest is eligible to receive a Certificate of Participation. The principal of each school wishing to award participation certificates shall order from the secretary-treasurer, on an order blank sent out by the state office, the number and kind of certificates needed: drama, debate, speech.

c. The number and kind of awards at the state contests shall be determined annually by the Board of Control. Currently the following awards are to be given at state contests:

In addition to the above awards for 1st, 2nd, and 3rd place winners in the state debate championship bracket, participating debaters on all other teams which survive the qualifying rounds will receive individual silver medals. In the consolation series the following school awards will be given (no individual awards): 1st place, school plaque; 2nd and 3rd places, framed certificates.

- d. Non-participating alternates in debate will not receive medals.

*11. Meetings of the Board of Control.

- a. Besides meeting annually early in November, the Board shall also hold a regular meeting the first part of May.
- b. The agenda for meetings of the Board of Control shall be prepared by the secretary-treasurer and mailed to the Board members no later than two weeks before a meeting.
- c. Any item a Board member wishes to have placed on the agenda must be mailed to the secretary-treasurer so it reaches him no later than three weeks before the meeting.
- d. Proposals for changes in the Constitution or Standing Rules must be written out and mailed to the secretary-treasurer so they reach him at least three weeks before the meeting; they will then be distributed with the agenda. Such proposals may be amended at the meeting before action is taken on them.
- e. Any item which is not on the distributed agenda can be taken up at the meeting only if two-thirds of the members present vote to consider it.
- f. Changes in contests and contest rules may be introduced at any meeting of the Board, but ordinarily final action will be taken on such proposed changes at the spring meeting. Adopted changes will be published in the next September Newsletter.
- g. Any changes in contests and contest rules shall go into effect immediately after their adoption, unless otherwise specified. Customarily, such changes are considered to be on a trial basis for two years. If not rescinded at the end of two years by action of the Board, the changes become a regular part of the Standing Rules.

II. Supplementary Rules for Drama

 A school wishing to enter the drama contest may select its play from any source; however, a choice from the Play List compiled by the state office, a list of recommended plays, is strongly urged.

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2. Authors of original plays to be entered in the drama contest may send their play manuscripts to the Advisor in Drama, Prof. Edward L. Kamarck, for his counsel and advice.

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- 13. The name and author of the play chosen must be sent to the WHSFA district chairman on or before October I. If the final choice of a play has not been determined by October 1, the names of those in preparation shall be submitted. Any school which does not send to its WHSFA district chairman the name of its play, or the names of those in preparation, by October 1 shall be ineligible to participate in the drama contest,
- 4. There is no rule which restricts the use of a given play to one school in each district.
- *5. Musical dramas may not be entered in the WHSFA drama contest. Song and dance may be present in a performance as incidental elements, but the production must rely inherently on dialogue and action.
- *6. Productions which are predominantly choral speaking may not be entered in the WHSFA drama contest. Choral speaking may be included in the performance, but the dialogue and action of individual actors must be dominant.
- 7. Sectional contests in drama will be held.
- 8. Plays entered in the WHSFA drama contest shall be proscenium stage productions.
- 9. Each school shall be permitted to enter only one play in a sub-district, district, sectional, or state contest.
- 10. Set-up time for each play in a WHSFA contest, at all levels of competition, shall be a uniform 10 minutes. No additional time is allowed for striking the set of the previous play.
- 11. Production time shall not exceed 35 minutes. The contest chairman shall appoint an official timekeeper who shall be stationed back-stage and should order the curtain pulled at the end of the 35 minutes. Being stopped shall in no way affect the rating.
- 12. Drama contests at the district, sectional, and state levels shall be judged by three iudges.
- 13. Schools receiving A awards in district and sectional dramatic competition shall be given Certificates of Achievement. These certificates are to be provided by the state Association and delivered to district and sectional chairmen as required. The recipient schools shall be responsible for entering the specific data on the forms provided.
 - (See General Rule 7k for regulations concerning the order of drama contests.)

III. Supplementary Rules for Debate

- **1. The official WHSFA debate proposition for 1970-71 is: Resolved: That the tederal government should establish, finance, and administer programs to control air and water pollution in the United States. The general problem area for discussion and debate in 1970-71 is: How can our physical environment best be controlled and developed?
- 2. The Forensic Quarterly of the Committee on Discussion and Debate of the National University Extension Association shall be the official handbook of the Association.
- 3. For district and sectional tournaments and for the first three rounds of the state tournament, each school shall certify in advance of the contest a team for each round of debate. This team shall consist of two affirmative and two negative debaters and may also have one or two alternates. If two, one must be designated affirmative alternate and one negative alternate. The alternates shall attend only

those debates in which their team is participating. They may not take part in the debate in any way except in case of illness of a debater. No debater shall participate on both sides in the same district or sectional tournament, nor in the first three rounds of the state tournament.

4. The order of debating shall be: constructive speeches - affirmative, negative, affirmative, negative; rebuttal speeches—negative, affirmative, negative, affirmative.

5. Time.

- a. Constructive speeches shall not exceed ten minutes; rebuttal speeches shall not exceed five minutes.
- b. There shall be an official timekeeper for each debate.
- c. Time cards shall be used for all contest debates. The timekeeper shall be seated in full view of the debaters, facing them, and shall display time cards to indicate at one-minute intervals the amount of time remaining for each debater. There shall also be a card to indicate when only one half minute remains.
- d. The timekeeper shall rise and remain standing at the full expiration of time for each constructive and rebuttal speech. When the timekeeper rises, the debater shall complete only the sentence already begun. If he continues beyond that sentence the judge shall stop him. Being stopped shall in no way affect the decision.
- e. The affirmative team shall provide time cards for each debate.
- 6. Judges in debate tournaments are asked to submit brief written comments for each debate on forms provided by the state office.
- 7. All schools which qualify to advance from the district to the sectional, and from the sectional to the state debate contest shall be given Certificates of Achievement. These certificates are provided by the state office and delivered to district and sectional chairmen as required. The recipient schools shall be responsible for entering the specific data on the certificates.

8. Tournament Procedure.

- a. The order of participation in district and sectional debate contests, as well as in the first three rounds of the state debate tournament, shall be determined by drawing lots at the beginning of the contest,
- b. In the event a debate team is not present at the time of the drawing, the contest manager shall draw for that team.
- c. If a team does not appear by the scheduled starting time, the other debates shall proceed as scheduled. If the tardy team is ready to debate within 15 minutes of the scheduled starting time, it shall be allowed to proceed without prejudice or penalty and with no reduction of time for constructive and rebuttal speeches. If the tardy team is not ready within 15 minutes of the scheduled starting time, it shall forfeit the debate to the opposition.
- d. Unless the contest manager has good reason to believe that a team which failed to appear for the first round will be ready to debate at the start of the second round, he shall, during the first round, re-schedule the succeeding rounds. Ten minutes before the second round he shall post the original schedule if the late team has arrived, or the revised schedule if the late team has not arrived. No change shall be made after the posting of the schedule.
- e. If a late team misses the first two rounds, it shall be ineligible to participate in any succeeding rounds.

9. District Tournaments.

a. Each district shall hold a debate tournament of three rounds if there are seven or more schools in the district wishing to compete in debate. If there are fewer

than seven such schools, the district chairman shall arrange to have them compete in a tournament of another district within the same section.

b. Any school which achieves a record of four wins and two losses, or better, in a district tournament shall be eligible to participate in sectional tournament competition.

10. Sectional Tournaments.

- a. Each section shall hold a debate tournament of three rounds.
- b. Any school which achieves a record of four wins and two losses, or better, in a sectional tournament shall be eligible to participate in the state tournament.



11. State Tournament.

- a. There shall be a state tournament, structured to determine a single first-place winner: three qualifying rounds; a run-off round, if necessary, to reduce the number of teams to eight; and three elimination rounds (an eight-team bracket) in which winners advance from quarter-finals, to semi-finals, to finals.
- b. All schools competing in the state tournament shall enter a team of affirmative and negative debaters in the first three rounds of the tournament. Any school which achieves a record of four wins and two losses (4-2), or better, in the first three rounds shall be eligible for further competition.
- c. Each school having a 4-2 record, or better, in the first three rounds shall certify a team of four debaters from which the school's coach may select any two debaters just before the start of any round in the elimination. Debaters may participate on both sides, affirmative and negative, after the three qualifying rounds in the state tournament.
- d. No more than eight schools shall participate in the elimination rounds of the tournament, an eight-team bracket.

Since competition in the elimination rounds is restricted to eight schools, if more than eight have a 4-2 record, or better, in the qualifying rounds, a run-off round shall be held to reduce the number to eight. To determine which schools are to compete in a run-off round, lots shall be drawn by schools with the lowest qualifying records.

- e. If fewer than eight schools have a 4-2 record, or better, some will be given byes. The usual method for determining byes shall be the drawing of lots by schools with the highest record. However, if the number of byes is the same or greater than the number of schools with a 6-0 record, those schools with a 6-0 shall automatically receive byes. Any remaining byes shall be drawn for by schools with the next highest record.
- f. When establishing the eight-team bracket, the following pairings should be avoided whenever possible: the meeting of teams which have met previously in the tournament, the meeting of schools which have met previously in the tournament, and pairing undefeated teams in the quarter-finals.
- g. In the elimination rounds, schools which advance should switch sides each round if possible. When this is impossible, sides shall be assigned by the contest manager, using as a determining factor the number of times a school has dehated on a given side in previous elimination rounds. If both schools have debated each side the same number of times, the decision shall be made by drawing lots. However, if two schools have met previously in the tournament and are scheduled to meet again, they shall be assigned sides opposite those debated in the previous meeting.
- h. In the first three rounds of the state tournament, each debate shall be judged by a single judge. In the quarter-final and semi-final rounds, each debate shall be judged by a panel of three judges. The final round shall be judged by a panel of five judges.
- i. Coaches are asked not to attend any round of debate at the state tournament except the final round.
- j. A consolation series of debates will be held for teams which do not survive the qualifying rounds.
- k. Debates in the consolation series are to be judged by coaches of teams in the championship bracket, without an honorarium, a single judge for each debate.

IV. Supplementary Rules for Extemporaneous Speaking

- 1. Selections may not be more than eight minutes. The official timekeeper shall use time cards to indicate the passage of each minute of time; he shall stand and remain standing at the end of eight minutes; the participant shall complete only the sentence already begun. If the participant continues further the judge shall stop him, but being stopped shall in no way affect the rating. There is no minimum time requirement.
- 2. The host school shall provide the time cards.
- 3. The periodicals from which topics (not titles) will be taken are the January, February, March, and April issues of American Observer, Current History, Newsweek, Senior Scholastic, and U. S. News & World Report.
- 4. For the state contest the secretary-treasurer shall select twenty to thirty topics (not titles) and write each such topic on a card. One hour before participation the contestant may draw five cards, choose a topic, and return four cards before the next contestant chooses. The same plan should be followed for all preliminary contests, substituting for secretary-treasurer, a person satisfactory to the participating schools.
- 5. A contestant may bring to the preparation hour his own magazines and dictionary, but no written or typed notes or outlines. In the presentation he may speak from notes prepared during the preparation hour. A contestant's notes shall be restricted to one 4x6 note card. The student may use both sides of the card for notes if he wishes. The host school shall provide uniform distinctive paper for participants to use in the preparation hour, and distinctive 4x6 note cards.
- 6. At the conclusion of each contest in extemporaneous speaking the judge may ask one or more pertinent questions of each participant, or he may designate any other person in the audience, at his discretion, to question the speaker.

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Properties, or visual materials, may not be used in presenting an extemporaneous speech.

V. Supplementary Rules for Four-minute Speech

- 1. The speech is to be written by the student on any contemporary problem.
- 2. Speeches shall be limited to four minutes. The timekeeper (or judge) shall give warning at the end of three minutes by raising his hand; he shall stand and remain standing at the end of four minutes, and the participant shall complete only the sentence already begun. If he continues further the judge shall stop him. Being stopped shall in no way affect the rating. There is no minimum time requirement.
- 3. Properties, or visual materials, may not be used in presenting a four-minute speech.

VI. Supplementary Rules for Original Oratory

- 1. The oration is to be written by the contestant who presents it.
- 2. Each oration shall not exceed eight minutes in length. The official timekeeper (or judge) shall stand and remain standing at the expiration of eight minutes, and the contestant shall complete only the sentence already begun. If he continues beyond that sentence the judge shall stop him. Being stopped shall in no way affect the rating.
- 3. There is no minimum time for orations. The discretion as to whether the length is suitable is left to the judge.
- 4. A student may not use the same oration more than one school year.
- 5. Properties, or visual materials, may not be used in presenting an oration.

VII, Supplementary Rules for Public Address

- 1. The public address general problem area for 1970-71 is:

 How can the educational needs of students in our contemporary society best be met?
 - a. For the sub-district contest the specific area will be:
 What educational needs are imposed on students by our contemporary society?
 - b. For the district contest the specific area will be: To what extent are schools meeting the educational needs of students in our contemporary society?
 - c. For the state contest the specific area will be:
 What can schools do to meet the educational needs of students in our contemporary society more successfully?
- 2. A speech in this contest shall be not more than eight minutes in length. At the end of eight minutes the official timekeeper or judge shall stand and remain standing and the contestant shall complete only the sentence already begun. If he continues beyond that point, the judge shall stop him. Being stopped shall in no way affect the rating. There is no minimum time requirement.
- 3. The speech may not be read from manuscript.
- 4. Note cards may be used.
- 5. At the sub-district, district, and state contests the student must deliver a speech based on the specific area, or topic, designated for that contest level.
- 6. A student may not use the same specific area, or topic, in more than one contest.
- 7. Properties, or visual materials, may not be used in presenting a speech in the public address contest.

VIII. Supplementary Rules for Significant Speeches

- 1. For this contest a student will select a single speech which has historical or contemporary significance and interpret that speech for his listeners.
- 2. The total length of a contestant's presentation in this contest shall be no more than eight minutes. At the end of that time the timekeeper (or judge) shall stand and remain standing and the participant shall complete only the sentence already begun. If he continues further the judge shall stop him, Being stopped shall in no way affect the rating. There is no minimum time requirement.
- 3. In his presentation the contestant will give pertinent information about the speaker, the audience, and the occasion on which the speech was delivered. He will also tell why he believes the speech was significant for the original audience and has significance for persons in his audience. The contestant's original portion of the presentation should constitute approximately two to four minutes of the eight minutes at his disposal.
- 4. As part of his presentation the contestant will also deliver a selected portion, or portions, of the speech of significance he has chosen. The contestant may position the quoted material wherever he wishes in his presentation.
- 5. The entire presentation is to be delivered from memory.
- Properties, or visual materials, may not be used in presenting a speech in the significant speeches contest.

IX. Supplementary Rules for Interpretative Reading of Poetry

- This contest shall be limited to the prepared reading of poetry from the printed page with the optional use of a reading stand. The selection is not to be memorized.
- 2. There is no list of prohibited readings.
- 3. Interpretative readings may not be more than eight minutes in length, including any introductory or expository remarks by the reader. The official timekeeper or judge shall stand and remain standing at the expiration of eight minutes and the participant shall complete only the sentence already begun. If he continues beyond that sentence the judge shall stop him. Being stopped shall in no way affect the rating. There is no minimum time requirement.
- 4. A student may use the same selection(s) in more than one contest (sub-district, district, state) in any given year of contest competition.
- Costumes and properties such as chairs, kerchiefs, flags, etc. may not be used in interpretative reading of poetry.

X. Supplementary Rules for Interpretative Reading of Prose

- This contest shall be limited to the prepared reading of prose from the printed page with the optional use of a reading stand. The selection is not to be memorized.
- 2. There is no list of prohibited readings.
- 3. Interpretative readings of prose may not be more than eight minutes in length, including any introductory or expository remarks by the reader. The official timekeeper or judge shall stand and remain standing at the expiration of eight minutes and the participant shall complete only the sentence already begun. If he continues beyond that sentence the judge shall stop him. Being stopped shall in no way affect the rating. There is no minimum time requirement.
- 4. A student may use the same selection(s) in more than one contest (sub-district, district, state) in any given year of contest competition.
- Costumes and properties such as chairs, kerchiefs, flags, etc. may not be used in interpretative reading of prose.

XI. Supplementary Rules for Memorized Declamation

- 1. There is no list of prohibited declamations.
- 2. Declamations shall not exceed eight minutes in length. The timekeeper (or judge) shall stand and remain standing at the expiration of eight minutes, and the contestant shall complete only the sentence just begun. If he continues beyond that sentence the judge shall stop him. Being stopped shall in no way affect the rating.
- 3. There is no minimum time for declamations. The discretion as to whether the length is suitable is left to the judge.
- 4. There is no rule prohibiting a student from changing his declamation as he progresses from one contest to the next.
- 5. A student may not use the same selection more than one school year.
- Declamations may be humorous or non-humorous, but only one contest shall be held, termed Memorized Declamation.
- Costumes and properties such as chairs, kerchiefs, flags, etc. may not be used in presenting a declamation.

XII. Supplementary Rules for Play Acting

- 1. In this event a group comprised of two to five contestants will present a scene from a play, without costumes, make-up, lights, or properties other than an available table (or desk as a substitute) and chairs, if the scene requires them. Hand props as well as stage props, other than those mentioned, are prohibited.
- 2. Music and sound effects are not permitted.
- 3. Lines are to be spoken from memory and contestants are encouraged to move as they would in a fully-produced play.
- 4. Only one entry of two to five persons will be permitted from each school.
- 5. Each contestant in the group shall portray only one character.
- There is no list of approved or prohibited plays for this contest. A choice from the Play List is suggested.
- 7. The time of the presentation shall not exceed 15 minutes. This includes the remarks the group may choose to make in introducing or explaining the scene it has chosen. At the expiration of 15 minutes, the timekeeper (or judge) shall stand and remain standing and the contestant speaking shall complete only the sentence already begun. If he continues beyond that sentence the judge shall stop him. Being stopped shall in no way affect the rating.
- 8. There is no rule prohibiting a group from changing its play as it advances from one contest to the next.
- In the event that one of the group is unable to appear at a contest, the coach may substitute any other eligible student.
- 10. The registration fee for this event at the state contest is \$5.00 for each member of the group.
- 11. A presentation in this contest shall be judged as a whole, but each participant shall receive identical individual awards.

PART IV

ANNUAL REPORT

The September issue of the WHSFA Newsletter is historical in nature, giving an account of the Association's activities during the previous year. Besides recording the membership of the Board of Control and presenting the 1969-70 financial statement of the state office, this section of the Newsletter reports the achievement of contestants. Of special interest are the participation summaries on pages 50, 62, and 84. These reveal the large number of students in Wisconsin high schools who benefitted from the program of the WHSFA last year.

BOARD OF CONTROL

At the close of 1968-69, the WHSFA constitution was amended to create two new districts, thereby adding two more district chairmen to the Board of Control. This addition increased the size of the Board from 12 to 14 members. The elections in the fall of 1969-70 were held to select eight chairmen, some to new chairmanships and others to fill vacancies caused by the expiration of terms of office and by persons leaving the Board.

Mr. Peter C. Hamel, Principal of Green Bay Preble High School, was elected to the chairmanship of the new Green Bay District for a three-year term, 1969 to 1972. Mr. Hamel had been chairman of the former Oshkosh District for three years. After the creation of the Green Bay District in the spring of 1969, he became chairman of that district by reason of his school's location.

Dr. Joseph P. Schwei, Principal of West Milwaukee High School, was elected as chairman of the new Kenosha District for one year, 1969-70, to fill the unexpired term of Mr. Walter J. Mountin who resigned from the Board because of a change in his position in the Oak Creek school system. Mr. Mountin had been Principal of the Oak Creek Senior High School, and had served as chairman of the former Milwaukee District since 1966.

Mr. Thomas J. Lynch, Principal of New Holstein High School, was elected chairman of the new Oshkosh District for a three-year term, 1969-72. When this district was created in the spring of 1969, Mr. Lewis Drobnick, Administrator of Omro Public Schools, consented to be temporary chairman for the district until the fall elections. Mr. Drobnick's work in organizing the new district deserves special mention and thanks from the Association.

Mr. Raymond Behnke, Principal of Cedarburg High School, was appointed by the Board in the spring of 1969 as interim chairman of the new Milwaukee District. After serving in a temporary capacity, he was elected to regular membership last fall. His term of office as chairman of the Milwaukee District is for two years, 1969 to 1971. This shorter term is necessary in order to establish an equitable rotation schedule, with no more than five Board members normally being elected in any one year.

Mr. Herman Laatsch, Administrator of Argyle Public Schools, was re-elected to a second consecutive term as chairman of the Platteville District. He had been on the Board previously, from 1961 to 1963. His present term of office is for three years, 1969 to 1972.

Mr. George Buckingham, Director of Student Affairs in the Whitewater Public Schools, was re-elected to a fourth consecutive term as chairman of the Whitewater District. He first came to the Board in 1960. His present three-year term is from 1969 to 1972.

Mr. Wallace E. Hoffman, drama coach and teacher at Green Bay Southwest High School, was elected to succeed Mr. Ervin C. Marquardt as chairman of the Central Section. Mr. Marquardt decided not to be a candidate for re-election after having been on the Board for 18 years. Mr. Hoffman's term is for three years, 1969-72.

Mr. Norman D. Flynn, speech teacher and debate coach at Monona Grove High School until the close of last school year, was elected to the chairmanship of the Southern Section in October 1969. He had served as an appointed interim chairman for several months prior to his election. The vacancy filled by Mr. Flynn was created when Mr. Arthur S. McMillion, former chairman of the Southern Section for seven years, moved from West Bend Senior High School to Eau Claire Memorial, a school located in another section. Last spring Mr. Flynn left the teaching profession, causing the chairmanship of the Southern Section to be open again. To provide for continuous leadership in this section, Sister Ann Marie Trimberger, teacher and debate coach at Pius XI High School in Milwaukee, was appointed to serve until the elections this fall.

In 1969-70 the Board of Control held two regular meetings, one in November and one in May. Highlights of the meetings were reported in the November 1969 and May 1970 Newsletters. Should any member school wish a complete set of minutes for either or both of these meetings, they may be obtained by requesting them from the state office of the Association.



February 27-28, 1970 The University of Wisconsin, Madison

Resolved: That Congress should prohibit unilateral United States military intervention in foreign countries.

In 1969-70 the state debate tournament included three qualifying rounds for all schools entered, plus an eight-team elimination bracket for schools with a record of 4 wins and 2 losses, or better, in the qualifying competition. This was the same tournament plan introduced last year. However, in 1969-70 a consolation series was added to the state tournament for the first time. All schools which did not qualify for the elimination bracket participated in two more rounds of debate. The win-loss record for the three qualifying rounds plus the two additional rounds determined the winner of the consolation series.




